

Lawyer Objects To Court Costs

Defence counsel J.O.C. Campbell, QC, raised several objections Friday to the costs assessed in the case of Daniel Tweed, Charlottetown, who was convicted by Magistrate James B. Johnson, QC, in Queen's County Magistrate's Court one week ago.

Tweed had been fined \$50 at the conclusion of the hearing. Yesterday afternoon a bill of costs which originally totalled \$176 was submitted. Objection by Mr. Campbell resulted in the amount being reduced to \$148 plus \$2 magistrate's costs.

Mr. Campbell objected to every item of the bill, particularly in regard to the allowance listed for Sgt. Lloyd Archer of the city police, whom he submitted was neither necessarily employed nor was his presence necessary to the prosecution.

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Fluoridation Benefits Outlined To Labor Reps.

Dr. B. J. O'Meara told a group of local labor union representatives that fluoridated water was definitely beneficial in the prevention of tooth decay among children and that used in the proper quantity had absolutely no ill effect on the human body.

At a meeting of local labor unions held last night in the Charlottetown and district Labor Union hall Dr. O'Meara showed a film on fluoridation and answered questions put to him on this subject by union representatives.

As a plebiscite has been called in regard to whether or not a fluoridation system will be installed in this city and will be voted on in February, Dr. O'Meara thought it wise to familiarize the citizens of Charlottetown with fluorides and their beneficial qualities.

Although it is a poison, as is chlorine, when concentrated, the one part of fluorine to one million parts water, the prescribed dosage, is in no way harmful to the human system but on the contrary has been proven beneficial.

PLEBISCITE CALLED City council last year passed a resolution to go ahead with a fluoridation system for the city but the water commission did not install the system. Instead they called for a plebiscite which will be voted on by the citizens, probably on Feb. 10th.

The cost of the city for the system would be in the vicinity of \$13,000 and the cost to the citizens about 20 cents per person per year. Dr. O'Meara pointed out the cost of having one tooth repaired over a 20 year period.

The need for such a system is great he said. Checks of local school show that children of six years have one or two decayed or decaying teeth. Children up to nine years have an average of five bad teeth. The 9 to 12 year group have 10 bad teeth and the 15-year-old group have up to 15 teeth in need of a dentist attention.

Because of this 13 local dentists agreed at a meeting that waters of the river would be polluted with floating sewage and the third is a legal technicality regarding the status of the town planning board.

The first has been overcome through the process of expropriation; the second has been circumvented by gaining the approval of the department of health. The third is still under consideration.

The citizens' group objecting to the sewer outfall in the North River has suggested two alternatives to council. They have suggested a pumping station that would force the sewage into the Government Pond outfall or in lieu of this, carry the York Lane outfall into the deep waters of the harbor.

W.H. Crandall, who has been the city's consultant on sanitation, contends that the two alternatives are not only uneconomical but entirely unnecessary. He has stated that the waters of the river are ten times the volume required for dilution purposes.
