The Pacific Railway Boom.

REPORTS AND COMMENTS.

THE important and (to the *Grits*) startling announcement made by Sir John A. Macdonald, at Bath, Ont., has been supplemented by reports from various sources. The telegraphic correspondent of the *St. John Telegraph* at Ottawa states that,—

"There can be no doubt that the Government have received offers from two companies to build the Canada Pacific Railway; one company is said to be controlled by the Earl of Dunmore, and the other by George Stephens, Bank of Montreal, who gets credit for being interested in other railway speculations, which may interest Maritime men."

By another despatch to the *Telegraph*, it is reported,—

"On good authority, that the Government are making an arrangement with a syndicate of British capitalists to build the whole Canada Pacific Railway, and that to ratify the agreement is the occasion of Sir Charles Tupper's visit to England."

The Halifax *Herald's* Ottawa correspondent says:—

"It is rumored that for some time past the Government has been in treaty with the representative of a Syndicate of English capitalists, who are now in Ottawa, with a view to forming a company to build the whole Pacific Railway, the Government giving a land subsidy and taking no further responsibility. Negotiations are said to be very nearly completed and Sir Charles is only awaiting advice before going to England to ratify the agreement with the principals."

The *St. John Sun* reports:

"We understand that Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir Charles Tupper and the Hon. John Henry Pope, will leave on Saturday for England in connexion with proposals for building the Pacific Railway and matters relating to Immigration."

Referring to the report, the *Montreal Gazette* says:—

"We sincerely hope that if the offers made are at all reasonable, and include the entire line from Thunder Bay westward, they will be accepted. It would be a great blessing if the line could be placed in the hands of a private company. Its construction would be accomplished with much greater rapidity, and an organization would be set in motion for the settlement of the North West, far more effective than any Government could put in motion, worked simply as a Government scheme."

The *Moncton Times* remarks:—

"It would be a good thing for the country in every respect if capitalists could be induced to take hold of the road on terms at all favorable, and relieve the country of the financial burdens its construction would impose, temporarily, at least; and it remains to be seen what course the Opposition papers, which have been crying out about the increase in the public debt the construction of the road will necessitate, will take if the rumored arrangement is concluded."

The *St. John News* declared that—

"*Bona fide* offers of the kind described by Sir John, from responsible parties would make sad havoc of Mr. Blake's great Pacific Railway speech of the last session of Parliament."

At any rate, the offer of the English Companies, whether accepted by the Government or not accepted, does away with the Pacific Railway scarecrow put up by the Opposition; for it shows, most conclusively and beyond a doubt, that practical men believe the building of the Railway is not a ruinous undertaking. It also shows what influence the brilliant jeremiads of the accomplished critic of "THE BYSTANDER" have upon the enterprising capitalists of Great Britain.

The Intercolonial.

We learn that the expenditure and revenue of the Intercolonial Railway met, for the first time, on the 30th day of June last. This gratifying fact is due to the economies recently practiced by the Government, and to the large increase of the traffic, consequent upon a revival of business. We congratulate the country and the Government upon this unmistakable evidence of economical management and increasing prosperity.

City Schools.

STATISTICS FOR THE TERM ENDING 30TH JUNE.

We are indebted to Mr. Oxenham, Secretary for the School Board, for the statistics which are given below. Referring to the statistics of last year, we note that there were then on the roll, eighty-seven more boys, and one hundred and fourteen more girls than this year. The "falling off" is partly to be accounted for in the establishment of the "Model School," which is not under the supervision of the School Board. But, the Model School apart, the statistics give rise to a fear that parents are beginning to lose interest in the City Schools. This should not so be. About two hundred more pupils are required to fill the Schools; and we hope they will be forthcoming next term. The following are the

The Cattle Trade.

Advices both by mail and cable from Great Britain report the cattle market there very dull, good heaves having declined fully \$10 per head. Advices dated Glasgow, 19th June, state that unfavorable weather existed, and that unless rain came shortly the turnip crop would be a miserable failure. The pasture lands were short of grass for want of rain, which necessarily caused more cattle to be thrown upon the market than there otherwise would have been. For the same reason the markets are fully supplied with sheep and lamb, which are lower.

Mr. W. A. PATRICK writes to St. John papers relative to the report of the discovery of a four foot vein of Albertite at Bellevue. His letter appears to be quite satisfactory. We understand that the mine has been on fire in the manner described by Mr. Patrick, three times within the last ten days. The circumstances seem to warrant the belief that Albertite is in close proximity to the point at which blasting operations are in progress. The body of gas which escapes through a fissure in the rock has been burning continuously since the 7th April. It is not surprising, therefore, that the Management have great confidence in the ultimate success of their enterprise.

It is estimated that the ice crop in Maine for last winter is about 1,500,000 tons, by far the largest ever raised in that State. The Kennebec alone gives 800,000, which, at the low price of \$2.50 a ton, would give \$2,000,000. Early sales were made at that price, but now that ice has sold for more than \$8, in New York, from \$3.75 to \$5, are the prices asked according to the time of delivery, etc.
