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McGinnis McCormick Can. Senior Golf Title

MONCTON (CP)—Norm Mogil of Toronto, who got into the Canadian senior golf championship tournament for the first time this year, walked off with the title Friday with a close one-up win over Brian McCormick of Kelowna, B.C.

Mogil, a student at Forest Hill College in Toronto, made better use of his iron than McCormick. The British Columbia boy found himself going for longer putts because McCormick invariably was in the hole on the green.

"I hit more greens and McCormick had to sink more putts to reach the hole," Mogil said. "I played my finest and most consistent golf here. I had been shaky all year but I worked hard last week."

"I wasn't worried when my ball was cast to two. I was playing the man. I was playing the course and going for my par in the green. His first putt left him only 20 inches from the pin."

McCormick, meanwhile, had missed the green with his second shot and was off to the right. He topped up 20 feet from the stick and sank his short putt to halve the hole and lead going into the last nine of the 36-hole final and had to stall off a 3-putt bogey on the 18th. This was also McCormick's first career title.

The battle between the two 21-year-olds turned into a thriller on the home stretch at the Moncton Golf Club.

McCormick bounced back from the three - four deficit to crack and nearly went back to just about his best when he caught up when he topped his hole on the 35th.

He managed to halve the hole, but Mogil refused to crack and nearly went back to just about his best when he caught up when he topped his hole on the 35th.

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McCormick said he hit "too many bad shots off the tee." He made the grade here, but he failed to qualify early.

There were only five birdies by both players in the 36 holes and only three bogeys. McCormick won the Penitence Open this year in the British Columbia junior tied for top Canadian.

Mogil didn't enter the Canadian junior play last year and in 1960 failed to qualify. This year the Toronto Maple Leafs youngster tried for the Ontario amateur and Ontario open tournaments. He failed to qualify in either. He made an other bid in the Canadian amateur.

McCormick three-putted four greens and Mogil three. Each had 73 for a 10-foot and in the afternoon they had identical 75s, but McCormick clipped a stroke off par along the final hole.
