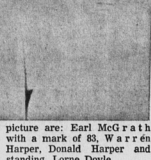

Organizing one of the biggest educational programs for operators and staff members, the P.E.I. Tourist Association is staging a "Project Hospital" under direction of L.G. Ercovod, executive director of the Canadian Tourist Association at The Charlottetown on Wednesday. It will be held in conjunction with the semi-annual meeting of the Association with President, Charles Linkletter, Summerside, presiding.

The president said yesterday the project had taken some time to arrange due to Mr. Ercovod's heavy schedule but he felt it would be of exceptional value to all members of the organization in presenting a program to improve the reception and care of tourists resort operators.
