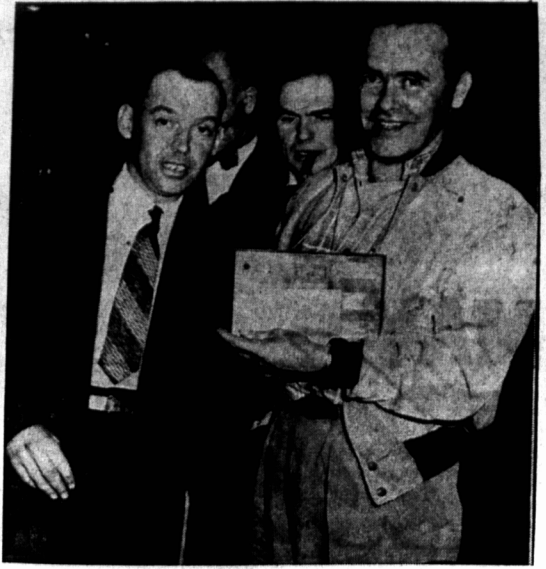

Continued from page 1 MacCallum, Charlottetown tie), 83. Festival officials on stage at this session were Mrs. Lorne Callbeck, presiding officer, and Mrs. Blair Andrew platform secretary. Two very large piano classes for juniors were adjudicated at Queen Charlotte High auditorium Tuesday afternoon by Dean Collins. These were Class 159, Piano Solo, nine years and under, and Class 160, Piano Solo, ten years and under. Presiding officer was Mrs. Robert MacKinnon and platform secretary, Mrs. Malcolm Reeves. Winners of Class 159 were: 1. Jimmie Farmer Charlottetown, 86; 2. Paul Kennedy, Cross Roads, 85; 3. Vodia N. Hughes, Winsloe, 84. In Class 160, first place was awarded to Judith Ann Presby, Charlottetown, who scored 87 marks, followed in second place by Donald Large, Charlottetown, 86, and third, Betsy Ives, Jimmie Farmer and Maureen Nates, all of Charlottetown, and all of whom tied for third place with 84. Mrs. Grace MacCallum, of Carleton, wife of the deceased man, stated that her husband was driving the car and was not going at a fast speed at all, when the collision occurred. "I have my doubts if we were going 20 miles per hour," she said. James Eric Ellis, of Summerside, the driver of the other car, said he was driving along carefully when he suddenly saw a car immediately ahead of him on his side of the road. He tried to cut his own car further to the side of the highway, but was prevented from so doing by the cutting. He had his lights on and said "as far as I remember, there were no lights on the other car." He said his vehicle was in perfect condition and that he had had considerable driving experience. Other witnesses heard were Mrs. Ruth Isabel Ellis of Summerside, Clifford Chappell, of York, John Alden Ellis, of 50 Edward St., Charlottetown, and Walter Burhoe of 3 Beech Street, Charlottetown. Jury members were: Clarence MacInnis (foreman), James McTague, William Soper, Ernest Perry, James Devine, John Squarebriggs, and Howard Hobbs. The jury deliberated for about half an hour before bringing in a verdict, but returned for further discussion in order to make the verdict more specific.

Weather Interferes

The persistent inclemency of the weather last evening prevented many of the contestants from arriving at the various centres at which the music festival competitions were held, thus causing a number of cancellations and readjustment in the programs scheduled. The diversity of the program presented at P.W.C. was noted by the adjudicator, Mr. Smale, who remarked that a program that moved from "Carmen" to sacred music called for considerable readjustment in mood on the part of the audience. Speaking to the competitors in Class 66, Soprano Solo, which was moved ahead to this session, the adjudicator emphasized that the singing of the test-piece, "Spring Sorrow" by Ireland, required "very careful phrasing, tonal control, and proper interpretation of the mood of the poem." He stated that each of the contestants had sung very well. Top placings in this class were as follows: 1. Joyce MacCallum, Charlottetown, 84; 2. Barbara G. Rogers, Charlottetown, 83; 3. Patricia Leightner, Charlottetown, 82. Barbara Rogers was awarded 84 marks for Oratorio, Solo, Class 66, "Hear Ye, Israel," in which she was the only contestant. Mr. Smale asserted that this soloist's voice exhibited "the nearest thing to the proper quality required" for this type of singing, stressing particularly, "the excellent oratorical tone" that she had maintained throughout her performance. Winners in the remaining classes completed at P.W.C. last night were: Class 64, Operatic Solo, female voice, own selection—1. Maida Rogerson, Charlottetown, 84; 2. Joyce MacCallum, Charlottetown, 82. Class 74, Sacred Solo, female voices, 16 years and over, own selection, 1. Barbara Rogers, Charlottetown, and Helen Wilson, Central Royalty, (tie); 2. Patricia Leightner, Charlottetown; 3. Joyce MacCallum, Charlottetown, and Carol MacLean, Summerside, (tie). Dr. L. W. Shaw, presided at this session. Q.C.H.S. NIGHT SESSIONS Dean Edwin A.
