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MISSIONARIES FROM INDIA VISIT AT FORTUNE COVE

Rev. Earl Leard, M.A., B.D. and Mrs. Leard arrived on Prince Edward Island Monday evening after completing their first term of service as missionaries of the United Church of Canada in Central India. They are accompanied by their children Bill aged 4 1/2 and John aged 3, both of whom were born in India.
 They will spend the next two weeks with Mr. Leard's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Russell Leard of Fortune Cove and then proceed to Chatham, Ontario to visit Mrs. Leard's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Orville Harwood.
 Mr. and Mrs. Leard were commissioned as missionaries at a special service held in Alberton, United Church in 1949. Previous to this Mr. Leard had received his early education at Fortune Cove School and Prince of Wales College after which he taught school for a few years. He graduated in arts from Mount Allison University and in theology from Pine Hill Divinity Hall. He took post graduate work at Union Theological Seminary from which he holds a master of arts degree in religious education. During his college years he served as a student minister in Western Canada and in the Maritimes. For two years prior to his appointment as a missionary he was secretary of boys and young peoples work with the Board of Religious Education.
 Mrs. Leard, the former Elinor Harwood of Chatham, Ontario, graduated in arts from the University of Western Ontario and took graduate studies at Radcliffe after which she taught at Alma College. She later graduated from the United Church Training School and completed second year theology at Emmanuel College. She served for one year as a home missionary and for another year with the W. M. S. candidate department.
 Enroute to India Mr. and Mrs. Leard studied for a year at Chesham College, Cambridge University in England. Mr. Leard received a bachelor of divinity degree in theology and also received a bachelor of divinity degree.
 In Central India they were engaged in educational evangelism, principally among young people. Stationed at Mhow Mr. Leard served as director of youth work for the Malwa Church Council, a position which required much travel throughout his district. Mrs. Leard served as principal of two schools at different times and during part of her term she taught kindergarten.
 Mr. and Mrs. Leard sailed from Bombay to Naples then travelled overland through Italy, Austria and Germany to Holland from where they sailed to England. After a few days in London they embarked for New York arriving there last Friday.
 During the winter months Mr. and Mrs. Leard will take further studies at Union Theological Seminary and Columbia University.

DRIVER RISKS NECK WITH Explosive Truck Cargo

KINGSTON, Ont., (CP)—A 41-year-old truck driver hurled his blazing transport past throngs of Christmas shoppers on downtown Princess street Tuesday and reached open country only moments before a thunderous explosion wrecked the vehicle.
 After the blast, Richard Lanther raced back to the blazing transport, unhooked the cab and drove it away before flames eating through the trailer could ignite his 100-gallon gas load.
