

# The Wet Look' Kevnotes Rainy Weather Fashions

The majority of coats were double-breasted with knub buttons, often in brass. A wide lowered belt, sometimes in back and sometimes all the way around, was repeated in many of the coats, along with the new lowered V necklines.

A navy plaid coat with a young look combined this new stretched neckline with another fashion feature, cotton pleated used here for a dicker. Charcoal pin stripes boy coat had a cap and detachable collar with white cotton pipe.

The rain coats came with matching headpieces. One pattern consisted of a triangle of matching material gathered on a wide, straight band. This was worn in a variety of ways—under the chin in bandanna style, or tied in back and tucked under to make a little cap.

Some coats came with a small two-cornered hat, worn at the back of the head. Others came with a wide, matching band.

So the two families plan together (sharing expenses) for the baby to be born and given for adoption. Thus the girl will have fulfilled their obligation in the matter.

The present chapter that really confuses me. The baby is born and the girl is allowed to custody it during her stay in the hospital; and the day she is to leave, the boy (the teenage father) is also allowed to hold the baby and, in fact, even asked what name he would have chosen for the baby, had he been keeping it.

In addition, I am a columnist writing about human relations for many years. I've been the confidante of a number of women who are in such a difficult position as you're parents and you're daughters of all walks of life, who have been suddenly faced with the ultimate responsibility.

On the basis of this experience, my advice is, don't take that particular TV tale too seriously. The story, as told on the TV screen, is the most no resemblance to the subjective realities of the situation it is trying to depict.

"PLEASE give in your column some tips on cooking game, especially venison." young homemaker asked me. "Last hunting season, my husband shot a deer. Within a few hours it was dressed, packed into our freezer and frozen."

"I tried cooking venison twice, but both times it was so tough we couldn't eat it. And my cookbook gave no help. I'm sure I gave the meat away. Now the hunting season is on again and my husband has two hogs to fill the freezer this month with game, and that I'll find out how to cook it!"

### ANSWER IS SIMPLE

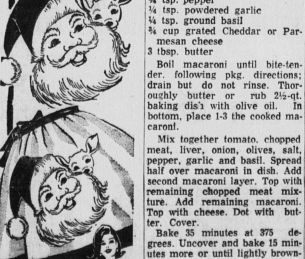
No lengthy handling or special marinating of game is necessary. Wild game of all kinds can be prepared by recipe for corresponding cuts of regular meat or poultry given in this column or in standard cook books. Only two following adjustments are necessary:

1. Before cooking, tenderize the game with a good meat tenderizer. This helps the game to fresh, or from and then thawed. It also helps to conserve natural juices and preserve flavor.

2. Use less salt than is called for in regular meats to offset the natural leanness of game meats.
