New Crisis In Mid-East Takes World Spotlight

A new crisis reached flood-tide in the Middle East, overlapping the old.

Jordan's young King Hussein battled desperately to keep the lid on mounting chaos in his little country—and to save his throne. Hussein, 21, clamped military law on his 1,500,000 subjects, named a new government and abolished Jordan's 10 political parties.

Hussein said his enemies are working against him outside Jordan and organizing riots within. He ordered a curfew in main cities. In his hardest words to date, he named Egyptian propaganda and international communism as the main sources of his trouble.

The outgoing government had held office only eight days, while Jordan's future became a crucial and immediate issue in the seething Middle East where Russia's influence is growing.

President Eisenhower declared that the United States supports Jordan's independence. The U.S. 6th Fleet made special movements in connection with the crisis.

Britain, supporting the U.S. stand, held consultations with France and allies of the Baghdad Pact.

SUEZ AT UN
The United Nations Security Council met in New York to consider a new declaration by Egypt on the Suez Canal.

President Nasser proposed that Egypt run the canal and collect tolls alone, while submitting to arbitration or the world court any disputes with users.

British newspapers said the U.S. had failed in attempts to win more suitable terms from the Egyptian dictator. But London reports indicated Britain might acknowledge Egypt's terms under protest pending new talks for a final settlement.

The British government told shipping companies to shun the canal pending the result of the New York deliberations and subsequent studies by the Suez Canal

Citizenship Granted To Lower Montague Couple At Geo'town

At a special sitting of the County Court of King's County, first circuit, held in the Georgetown Court House on Friday, April 26th at 11 a.m. His Honor Judge J.S. DesRoches presented certificates of citizenship, granted by J.W. Pickersgill, Minister of Citizenship and Immigration, to Mr. and Mrs. Lambertus Bernardus Haneveld of Lower Montague, P.E.I.

The ceremony was solemn and impressive as both Mr. and Mrs. Haneveld took the oath of renunciation and allegiance before his honor. Attesting them was the clerk of the court, J.W. Lavers. Following the presentation of the certificates and the administration of the oath, His Honor congratulated the couple and made the following observations:

He spoke of the full rights of Canadian citizens—freedom of worship, freedom to take part in meetings and discussions, freedom to enjoy property, freedom of enterprise, the right to vote and the freedom of the press. He spoke of the fact that a citizen cannot be imprisoned without just cause, and that he maintains the right of legal defence. In return, a citizen is expected to defend his country in time of need. His Honor then wished Mr. and Mrs. Haneveld a long and happy life to enjoy the opportunities and privileges that Canada has to offer.

OTHER CONGRATULATIONS
Rev. J.M. Fraser, of the United Church, Montague congratulated the new citizens and said he was happy to be present on this occasion and agreed with the remarks and observations made by His Honor. He also said there were important years ahead for receiving citizens such as these from other lands.

Rev. W.A. Paterson of the Georgetown United Church then spoke briefly. He associated himself with His Honor and Rev. Mr. Fraser in their remarks and welcomed the new citizens on behalf of the Canadian Legion. He went on to say that the ceremony of renunciation to the land of their birth must be difficult, but that in swearing allegiance to Canada, "we, as citizens must see that they obtain all the freedoms and the opportunities of this Dominion".

Mrs. J.M. Fraser offered her congratulations to the new citizens and warmly welcomed them to Canada. In reply to the many congratulations and good wishes, Mr. Haneveld thanked those present, and said that he and his wife were very happy and proud to be here and accepted as full-fledged citizens.

Mr. and Mrs. Haneveld were former citizens of Holland and came to Canada in 1950. Since then, they have resided in Charlottetown and Central Bedouque.

LETTER PRESENTED

The following is a copy of a letter from J.W. Pickersgill, Minister of Citizenship and Immigration, which was presented by His Honor to the new citizens.
"I wish to take this opportunity of congratulating you personally upon the attainment of Canadian citizenship. By this certificate of citizenship you have been granted the rights and privileges of a citizen of Canada. These rights and privileges entitle you to freedom of speech, religion, thought and action, the right to vote as you choose, and the right to be secure in your possessions.
"Your citizenship carries with it the obligation of defending your adopted country in time of need, of living in peaceful brotherhood with your fellow Canadians, and of doing your part in the preservation of Canadian Ideals and institutions.
"I extend to you a warm welcome on this solemn occasion and I invite you to share with me the ancient liberties of a free people living together in harmony, under a democratic government which recognizes the rights of all citizens."

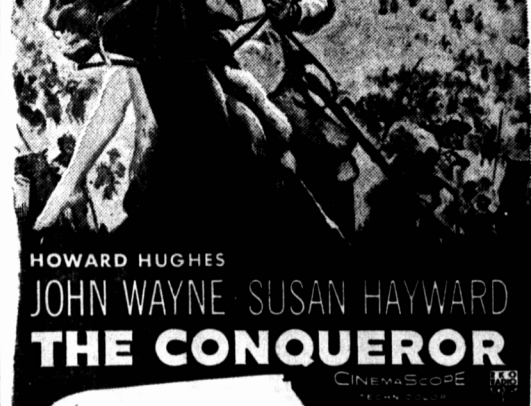
