

Household Hints.

CALF'S HEART ROASTED.—Put the heart in luke-warm water for an hour, then wipe it dry; stuff it with a nice and highly-seasoned veal stuffing or forcemeat, cover it with buttered paper, and set it down to toast in a good oven from half an hour to an hour depending on the size; serve it with any good gravy.

CREAM RICE PUDDING.—Wash four ounces of rice through two waters, put it in a baking dish with three ounces of sugar and a teaspoonful of flavoring; pour in three pints of milk and put into a moderate oven, and bake one hour and a half, or until it is of a creamy consistency. This is very delicate and wholesome.

HINTS ON WASHING.—Clothes should not be soaked over night; it gives them a grey look, and the soiled darts lying against the clean portions streak them. Rub the clothes in warm, not hot water, for hot water sets, in place of removing the dirt. Wash flannels in luke-warm water, and avoid rubbing soap on flannels.

FOWL INDIAN FASHION.—Take the meat from a cold fowl, and cut it in small pieces. Put half a pint of well-flavored stock into a stewpan, add a little salt, pepper and nutmeg, and thicken with flour and butter; let it boil, then put in the pieces of fowl to warm; after stewing sufficiently, serve with some poached eggs laid on the hash, with a sprig of parsley in the centre, and garnish round the plate with pieces of fried bread.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Five hundred hands are employed full time at Londonderry Iron Mines.

The British fleet leaves Halifax for the West Indies the middle of November.

The Russian Government has ordered enormous quantities of steel cannon and other implements of war.

Hanlan has signed and forwarded to Courtney, articles for a race at Chautauqua Lake on the 15th proximo.

The Kladderadatsch of Berlin advises the English Government to promote the King of the Zulus to the rank of General, and make him Commander-in-Chief to the English armies in Afghanistan.

Scarlet fever is prevailing in Jersey City to such an extent that the schools are closing. At Mahasset, Long Island, the schools are closed and the inhabitants are leaving on account of it.

The Quebec Governor is said to have declined ratifying, under present circumstances, some important appointments submitted for his approval by the Joly Government, though he has consented to some trivial ones.

The bill for the abolition of slavery in Cuba to be presented to the Spanish Cortes provides that slaves aged 55 and over shall become free immediately; those aged 50, in September, 1880; those aged 45 in 1882, those aged 40 in 1884, those 35 in 1886; those aged 30 in 1888, and all the others in 1890. From 1889, one hundred thousand piastres will be charged on the Cuban budget for expenses of emancipation; 350 piastres will be paid to owners for each slave; the Government will as much as possible favor immigration of free laborers.

The three living Englishmen most celebrated for their knowledge of applied physics and metallurgy—Sir Joseph Whitworth, Sir William Armstrong, and Sir Henry Bessemer, are all said to be distinguished for their love of nature, and the closest imitation of natural beauty in the grounds of their country seats that are to be produced. Sir Henry Bessemer himself planned out all the lovely lawn and terraces of his estate of Denmark Hill. He is now busy building himself an observatory, destined to obtain a telescope capable of magnifying 5000 times. He has a very large fortune, and has fallen back on astronomy for a pastime.

France is a happy country, says a Manchester paper. While every other nation in Europe is bemoaning over deficits and financial difficulties, her revenue is pouring in and exceeding the estimates by large sums. The returns for the month of September have just been made up, and they show that the receipts exceed the estimates by 14,000,000 francs. The total sum received during the first nine months of the present year exceeds the estimates by 108,000,000 francs. So that, if France continues to progress financially during the last quarter of 1879 in the same ratio as she has done during the past three quarters, at the end she will find herself the possessor of a surplus of between \$20,000,000 and \$30,000,000.

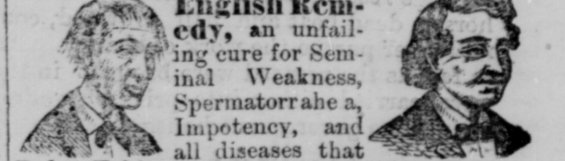
