Feller Pitches 12th One-Hit Game; Rookie Strikes Out 12 As Indians Take AL Lead

Veteran Bob Feller pitched his 12th one-hit game and rookie Herb Score struck out 16 batters as Cleveland Indians swept a double-header Sunday from Boston Red Sox 2-0 and 2-1 to take over first place in the tight American League race.

Feller, who already owns three no-hitters, came within eight out of a record-breaking four. A one-out single by Sammy White in the seventh was the only Boston hit. It was Feller's 263rd victory.

Score, 21-year-old southpaw who set an American Association record of 330 strikeouts last season, came within two of Feller's major league record. He had 14 strikeouts in seven innings but added only one in the eighth and one in the ninth.

Larry Doby singled in the second inning of the opener and scored what proved the deciding run on an infield out by Jim Hegon. Hegon tripled Ralph Kiner home with the Indians' other run.

In the second game, Doby's first inning double scored Bobby Avila, who had singled, and Vic Wertz, who had walked. Ted Lepcio and Sam Mele doubled for the Red Sox in the second.

DODGERS WIN ANOTHER
The National League leading Brooklyn Dodgers won their 15th game in 17 starts as they continued their fantastic spurt with a 5-4 triumph over Milwaukee Braves.

A bloop single to centre by pinch hitter George Shuba scored Gil Hodges with two out in the eighth to snap a 4-4 tie. Hodges and Duke Snider homered for Brooklyn while Eddie Mathews slammed his first four bagger of the season for Milwaukee.

Johnny Antonelli turned in a brilliant, six-hit, 16-inning effort as New York Giants nipped Cincinnati Redlegs 2-1 on pinch hitter Bill Taylor's 10th inning single.

The blow scored Whitey Lockman from third with the winning run. Bob Hooper, fourth of five Cincinnati hurlers, was the loser. The second game of the doubleheader was postponed because of darkness.

St. Louis Cardinals moved into second place in the National League although they split a doubleheader with Pittsburgh. The Cards won the opener 4-3 but were shut out by Ronnie Kline 7-0 in the nightcap. It was the first victory for Kline, who has been in the military service two years.

Felipe Montemayor, who hit his first major league home run in the opener, also socked a four-bagger in the nightcap. George Freese connected for a grand slam homer in the eighth of the nightcap.

Chicago Cubs whipped Philadelphia Phillies 8-7 in the first game of a doubleheader and led 4-2 in the nightcap's ninth inning when play was suspended because of the Pennsylvania Sunday curfew law.

A two-out, bases-loaded single by Randy Jackson in the ninth scored the tying and winning runs. The opener, which was suspended in the eighth, was snapped a 2-2 tie in the second game. The game will be completed tonight.

Bonus rookie Al Pylburn's bases loaded pinch single in the 11th inning drove in two runs and won the opener for the Orioles. Billy Pierce won his first game of the season for Chicago in the nightcap. The Sox snapped a 2-2 tie with four runs off loser Jim Wilson in the seventh.

Kansas City moved into fifth place, ahead of the Red Sox, with a 16-10 triumph over Washington. A six-run seventh broke up a 10-10 deadlock. The As collected 16 hits with Jim Finigan driving in three runs and scoring four with a double, triple and two walks.

The Cataracts, who seem to have adopted the Forum as their home ice, now lead the best-of-five series 3-2. They have won all three games played here while the Western Hockey League champions have taken both contests played in Shawinigan Falls.

LONDON (AP)—A royal race with Queen Elizabeth riding one horse and Princess Margaret another—took place privately at the famous Royal Ascot track at nearby Windsor. Princess Margaret won.

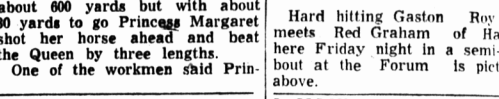
The race of the two Royal sisters was run recently in comparative privacy, 40 workmen and a top-hatted riding master being the only witnesses. One of the workmen, engaged in painting the stands, summed up enough courage Sunday to tell about it:

"We saw them enter by the gate that joins Windsor Castle ground to the race course. They were in riding clothes, wearing colored head scarves. The Queen had on a yellowish one and the princess a darker colored scarf. The horses were jet black. Following them on another horse was the riding master from Windsor Castle in top hat."

After walking their horses down to Asco's golden gate they turned and came back. Just as they reached the three-furlong mark, Princess Margaret turned to the Queen and said something. Quickly the riding master was left far behind as the royal sisters galloped neck and neck down the stretch. The dazzled workmen downed tools and watched in utter amazement.

It was a ding dong battle for about 600 yards but with about 30 yards to go Princess Margaret shot her horse ahead and beat the Queen by three lengths.

One of the workmen said Princess Margaret had a far larger horse than her sister. He said both rode beautifully.
