Another \$50 Million Sought For Colombo Plan Spending

OTTAWA (CP) — Parliament is being asked to vote another \$50,000,000 for the Colombo plan of Commonwealth aid to South and Southeast Asia, the largest

ing contributions to foreign aid programs and membership in international organizations, will be \$94,953,967, an increase of \$1,193,309 over the current fiscal year.

The current year's \$1,500,000 for the purchase of flour to be given to the United Nations relief and works agency for Palestine refugees in the near east

is being cut in the new fiscal year to \$500,000. All other contributions to international economic and special aid programs are being maintained at the same level or increased.

The cost of the department's headquarters administration and Canada's representation abroad — including am-

bassador's salaries and the capital cost of constructing and improving embassy buildings—will amount to \$22,755,100 in the new fiscal year, an increase of \$2,937,067.

The assessment for Canada's membership in the United Nations organization in 1962-63 will be \$2,184,000 in U.S. funds, an increase from the current year's

assessment of \$1,933,000. In Canadian funds, this meant raising the appropriation to \$2,272,732 from \$1,910,278.

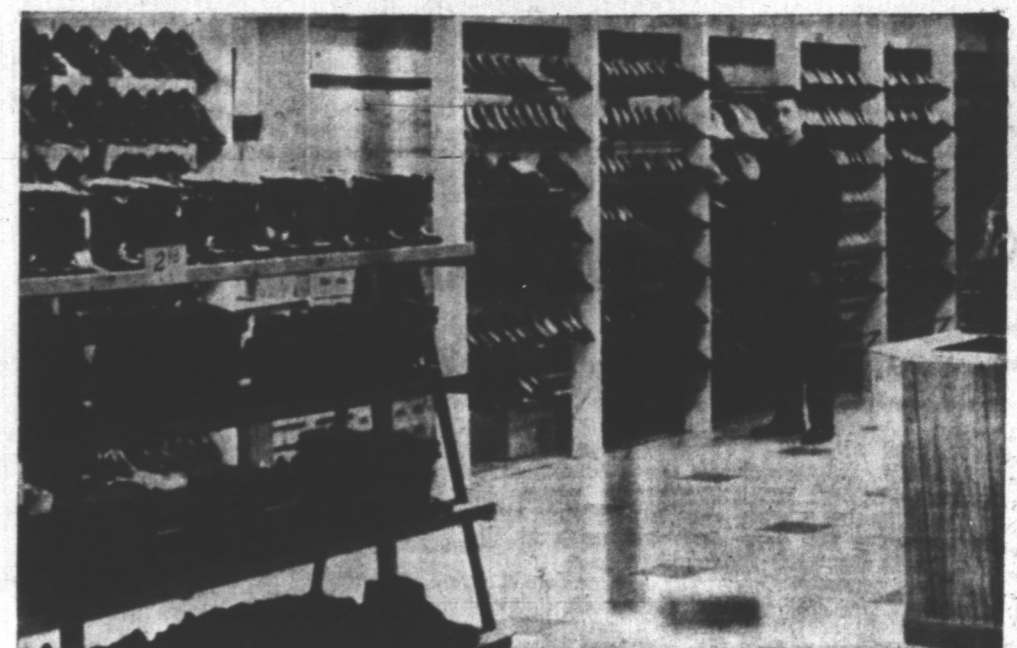

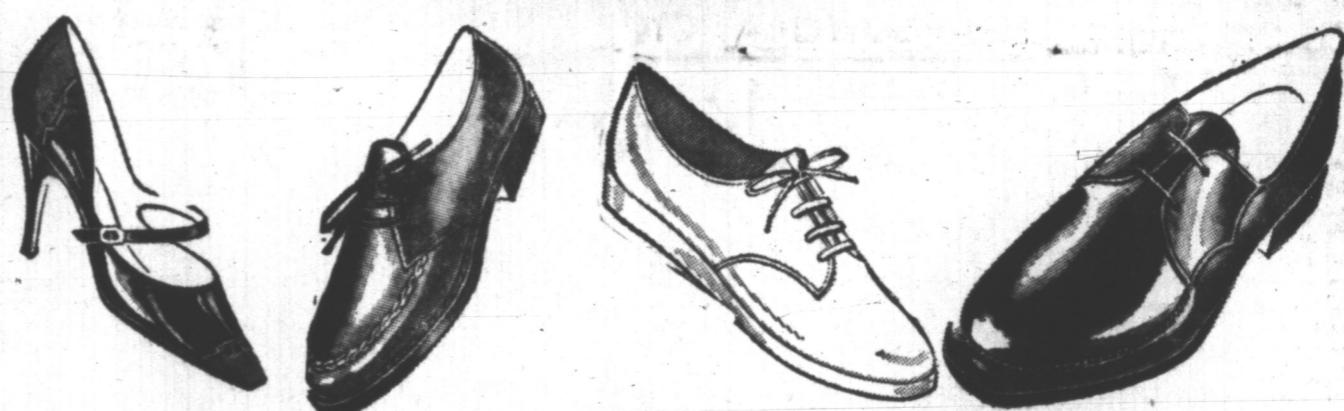
