

Three Members Of Montreal Royals Arrested In Miami

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (CP)—Three members of the Montreal baseball club were arrested for disorderly conduct in a night club early Tuesday as they sought a "man in a white shirt" whom one of the trio claimed had struck him in the club's men's room.

All three were charged with disorderly conduct and one was also charged with resisting arrest and drunkenness after police said he hit an officer.

Charged were pitchers William (Billy) Harris, 25, of Dorchester, N.B., and Robert F. Walz, 24, an catcher Homer (Dixie) Howell, 36. They are to appear in court today.

Harris and Howell were released shortly after their arrest at 4 a.m. after posting \$50 bail each. Walz, who faces the three charges, remained in jail until noon when manager Greg Mulvey of Montreal Royals arrived to post \$200 bail.

NOT IN THE LINEUP

Employees at the Harem Club, an all-night tourist spot, said the players were drinking mixed drinks.

Harris was scheduled as starting pitcher in Montreal's International League game Wednesday night against Miami Marlins but none of the three played.

Police Sgt. Al Lamplsey said the fracas apparently started after Harris returned from the men's room and told his friends he had been struck by a "man in a white shirt."

The three started through the crowded night club in search of the man, Lamplsey said, but before long three squad cars arrived.

Lamplsey said the men were "boisterous and belligerent" but calmed down when ordered to leave. However, he said, Walz changed his mind and said he was "going to stay right here and finish this."

Police said Walz hit patrolmen Robert Ruff and Gerald Cavanaugh on the hands when they tried to take him from the night club.

PHILS BEAT REDS

Yanks Win 6th Straight; Dickson Blanks Brooklyn

DETROIT (AP) — Tommy Byrne pitched five-hit relief ball and hit a home run Tuesday to lead New York Yankees to a 5-3 win over Detroit Tigers. It was the league-leading Yankees' sixth victory in succession.

Byrne held the Tigers hitless in all but the sixth and ninth innings after relieving starter Bob Finner with two out in the third.

Byrne recorded his third triumph against one setback but needed help from Tom Sturdivant in the ninth.

The Yankees overcame a three-run deficit in the seventh inning, threw the score against Detroit starter Frank Lary who had beaten the Bombers three times without a loss this season.

Andy Carey delivered a tie-breaking single in the eighth and Byrne smashed his second home run to lead off the ninth.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Billy Bruton and Hank Aaron each drove in two runs Tuesday night as Milwaukee Braves defeated Pittsburgh Pirates 5-3 for their fourth straight victory. The win moved the Braves into third place in the National League.

The loss was the Pirates' fourth in a row and dropped them from second to fourth place.

Lew Burdette led the Pirates to seven hits over the first eight innings but weakened in the ninth, giving up one run on three hits. Burdette was credited with his sixth victory against three losses.

Bob Friend, who pitched with only two days rest, in effort to halt the Pirates' losing streak, lasted seven innings, giving up four runs on five hits. He was charged with his fourth defeat against 11 victories.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Philadelphia Phillies scored four runs in the eighth inning Tuesday night, including a two-run homer by Del Ennis, to defeat the league-leading Cincinnati Redlegs 4-2.

Ennis set an all-time record for home runs. It was his 24th lifetime homer for Philadelphia, breaking the previous mark of 243 held by oldtimer Chuck Klein.

The last-place Phillies, held scoreless with three hits for seven innings by Johnny Klippstein, were trailing 2-0. Then Richie Ashburn walked and went to third on Marv Blaylock's single. Starn Lopata batted a triple to centre, scoring two runs and ambled over on Ennis' homer, his 11th of the season.

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Giants shut out Chicago Cubs 2-0 Tuesday night behind Johnny Antonelli's five-hit pitching. Manager Bill Rigney used pitcher Reuben Gomez in the Giant outfield for the last two innings to provide defensive strength.

Antonelli turned in his second shutout of the year and his first complete game since blanking St. Louis May 20.

The light-hitting Giants made only five hits themselves, but got plenty of mileage from them.

The victory was Antonelli's sixth against five defeats, while Bob Rush of the Cubs who was relieved by Turk Lown in the eighth, now has a 6-3 mark.

Ben Hogan And Sam Snead Fly To Golf Tourney

NEW YORK (AP)—Ben Hogan and Sam Snead kidded each other like schoolboys Tuesday before departing by air for the International golf matches at the Wentworth Club in Surrey, England, starting Sunday.

The two old warhorses of the links, who have dominated the American golf picture for the last decade, will meet two teams from 28 other nations in the annual Canada Cup and International Trophy competition from June 24-26.

Stakes Claim As Top Racer

LONDON (CP) — John Surtees, 23-year-old speed demon from the London suburb of Catford, has staked his claim as one of Britain's top motorcycle racers.

The slim, dark-haired speedster this month capped a five-year drive to the top by winning the senior tourist trophy — Europe's top motorcycle award — over the gruelling 37-mile Isle of Man course.

Only a maintenance-pit fallow prevented Surtees from claiming an unusual double — the junior and senior titles. He was leading in the junior event but his pit crew did not fill his tank on his final refuelling stop, and he ran out of gas on the final lap.

TIPS ON GOLFING

Both Wrists Need Freedom

and downswing into one continuous motion.

All of this seems so obvious. Then how do you account for the current popular teachings which advocate minimizing or eliminating wrist action? Holding the left wrist firm, as many of the younger tournament pros now try to do invariably results in a locking somewhere in the backswing or downswing.

Another popular stunt is to block the wrist action or turnover of the hands in the bottom of the swing in an effort to steer the shot.

A form of this brought its performer a record heart-break loss which is a story in itself. It's natural for anybody to be afraid of anything they don't fully understand.

If you subscribe to the logic of wrist action being vital to a true swing technique then I urge you to give it plenty of attention in all of your practice swings and if you have been following this home practice series of exercise then continue your daily kneelover swing and check both wrists and hands with the accompanying illustrations. Also check your grip. Wrong thumb positions or pressures will lock your wrists. The proper hold will leave both wrists free.

LONDON (AP) — The British Lawn Tennis Association—guardian of the amateur status of Wimbledon, com. flors said Tuesday it has advised Althea Gibson not to talk to newspapermen unless a tennis official lists in.

The advice was given by S. B. Reay, secretary of the Association to the 23-year-old New York negro girl, one of the leading competitors in this year's Wimbledon championships.

Reay stepped in following publication in the London Daily Mail of two articles on Miss Gibson's career, under the title "From Harlem to Wimbledon." The Mail made clear that the articles were based on interviews and were not written by Miss Gibson.

Gordon Pirie Runs To World Record In 5,000 Metre Race

BERGEN, Norway (CP)—Britain's Gordon Pirie, running on a rain-soaked track at Kirova Stadium here, Tuesday set a world record of 13 minutes, 36.8 seconds for the 5,000 metres.

The great British runner forged ahead of Russia's Vladimir Kuc 30 metres from the finish and won by 25 metres in the highlight of an international track and field meet.

Pirie and Kuc both broke the official world record of 13 minutes, 40.6 seconds set by Sandor Iharos of Hungary at Budapest last October. Kuc's time Tuesday was 13 minutes, 39.6 seconds.

The Russian took the lead from the start, followed closely by the 25-year-old English point salesman.

In the fourth and final lap, Pirie tried to pass Kuc but each time he made his bid the Russian pulled away. Finally, with 300 metres to go, Pirie put on a terrific spurt to go ahead.
