Old Cemetery Well Cared For

The annual meeting of the trustees of the Old Protestant Cemetery on Elm Avenue was held Tuesday afternoon. Before attendance this meeting several members of the Board visited the cemetery and found everything in order, the grass nicely cut, which is done regularly by the caretaker, the fences in repair, and otherwise this large area is in excellent condition. In winter the sidewalk is kept clear of snow.

Several citizens have complimented the Board on the way this historic spot is being looked after. The upkeep is paid by contributions, made yearly by the several Protestant churches in the City. These churches are in turn entitled to have a representative or representative on the Board. During Centennial Year - 1955 - some special work was done in this cemetery, removing stumps, and old trees, straightening tombstones, etc., so that it is now in a very creditable condition. The remains of many prominent citizens of earlier days are interred in this historic ground.

MacDonald, Chancellor, who chatted briefly with Archbishop Panico, His Excellency Bishop MacEachern and Monsignor Patrick McMahon, Rector of the Basilica, in the reception line. An unusual and highly pleasing feature of the reception was the introduction of Dr. Roderick J. MacDonald, Knight of St. Gregory who much to the amazement of the Archbishop, mentioned his age, 99 years and two months.

Following the reception, Archbishop Panico, accompanied by

Very Rev. P. Laframbois, Quebec Provincial of the Oblate Order, His Excellency Bishop MacEachern and Very Rev. P.F. MacDonald visited Mount St. Mary's where they were received by Sister Francis Loyola, Mother Superior General, Sisters of St. Martha. Archbishop Panico was guest of honour at a noon dinner yesterday at St. Dunstons University, where the clergy were presented, following the arrival of the distinguished guest and a welcome extended by the Rector, Very Rev. J.A. Sullivan.

The Archbishop and Rev. Laframbois will visit Summerside today, returning to the city in the evening.

Stanley Bridge Water Classes

Stanley Bridge entered the roll of enthusiastic Swimming and Water Safety communities on Thursday, July 11th. The local Water Safety committee under the capable chairmanship of Mrs. Ray Douglas sponsored a demonstration and film show on Water Safety and Artificial Respiration.

A person convicted of stealing a quantity of gasoline was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days by Magistrate Gaudet at Queen's County Magistrate's Court yesterday, and was required to enter into a recognizance of \$500. A similar charge against a City resident was dismissed.

Highways Dept. Studies Costs Of Machinery Maintenance

With a view to increasing the efficiency of their maintenance staff and operators of heavy road equipment, the Department of Highways through the co-operation of the Good Roads Association of Canada has instituted a training plan which they hope will tend to decrease maintenance costs and at the same time lengthen the life of the machines in use.

The training plan which is now in operation in the Department's garage will be expanded as time goes on and it is hoped that a syllabus of training in mechanical maintenance will be included in school courses at the grade ten level.

Hon. George MacKay, Minister of Highways who announced the training program yesterday, said the Department faces many difficulties in meeting the ever mounting demand for snow free roads and in securing a sufficient number of trained personnel to operate and service the machines.

COMPLEX MACHINES
He pointed out that with the increasing complexity of these machines, very highly trained men are required. "The shortage of highly trained mechanics is felt not only in our department but by all agencies concerned with the maintenance and repair of automotive vehicles and road building equipment. The need for maintaining our roads to the peak of efficiency is a duty we take very seriously," said Mr. MacKay.

The Minister said that realizing the foregoing, the Department asked for and received the assistance of the Canadian Good Roads Association.
