A NEW York paper says the Duke of Edinburgh will visit Washington after leaving Halifax, as the guest of Sir Edward Thornton.

THE ropewalk of Mr. O'Connor, and the St. John Agricultural Society Stables, at Marsh Bridge, St. John, N. B., were consumed by fire on Friday morning.

THE barque "Bristol," 1,322 tons, launched yesterday by Churchill and Sons, of Hantsport, N. S., is said to be the largest barque-rigged vessel in the Dominion.

IN a warm and hearty letter to the Mayor of Halifax, the Marquis of Lorne expressed his own gratification and that of his wife at the cordial reception given to them by the people of that city.

WE are instructed to state that St. Andrew's Dinner, at the Revere House, on Monday evening, will be at nine o'clock, instead of at 8 o'clock, to give all who wish time to hear Dr. Taylor's lecture.

DESPATCHES from the East announce the evacuation of Dakka and Jelalabad, and their occupation by the British forces, the Afghan army retiring from Jelalabad very hastily and falling back on Cabul.

AN Indian, very much under the influence of liquor, staggered along Water Street at one o'clock to day. Although the law is very severe upon parties selling intoxicating drink to those Aborigines, it is nevertheless constantly violated.

THE Rev. Dr. Lauchlin Taylor, whose lectures on Eastern Travel are still remembered with interest in this city, may be expected to officiate in the Methodist Church to-morrow at 10.30 a. m. The evening service will be conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. Lathern.

MR. WILBUR FENNO THAYER, one of the "Empire Flouring Mill Co.," St. Louis, arrived in Charlottetown last evening. Mr. Thayer's mills are among the largest in the world—grinding 1,200 bbls. per day. He will spend a day here among our importers, talking up the points of his flour.

MR. ISAAC WATERMAN, Reeve of London, Ont., received last evening from Paris the decoration of the Legion of Honor, awarded him in consideration of personal service rendered at the late Exposition. Mr. Waterman exhibited samples of petroleum and its products from the works at London, Ont.

A correspondent of the St. John Telegraph states that a startling affair occurred at Central Norton on the evening of Monday last. While Mr. William McVey, wife and son, and Mr. James and William Provan were all quietly sitting in the house of the former, Mr. McVey, they were suddenly startled by a gun being discharged through one of the windows by some unknown person. The ball passed the middle pane in a slanting direction, grazing Wm. Provan's head and entered a panel of the door leading out, just above Mr. McVey. Search was immediately made, but the night being dark no clue could be got the perpetrator. The affair has caused a good deal of excitement in the locality.

WHEN a New Brunswicker or a Nova Scotian commits some rascally criminal offence and is apprehended for the same, he in all cases says he is a P. E. Islander, and gives an assumed name. On Thursday last a case of this kind occurred in St. John. "Last evening," says the Sun of the 29th, "about a quarter past seven, while Mr. Daniel Doherty, clothier, of Main Street, was at supper with his family in the back of the shop, a young fellow, apparently twenty years of age, walked noiselessly into the shop, went behind the counter and abstracted from the showcase a number of silver watches. One of the women happening to enter the shop, the thief darted past her and out the door, followed by her, shouting. A little 12 year old son of Mr. Doherty followed the thief closely and found him in McCann's alley behind a barrel. The little fellow, with indomitable pluck, clinched him and held on to him for some time, but finally was obliged to let go, his strength not being equal to the task. The thief, on emerging from the alley, ran on down Main Street, and was caught by Mr. Doherty's elder son, who laid him gently down. The police were immediately on the spot and the thief was taken back to Mr. Doherty's shop, and on searching him there were found two silver watches and a watch case. The fellow gave his name as Harry Wilson, of P. E. I., and took the matter very coolly. On further examination of their prisoner at the station house, the police found another silver watch in his boot. His name turns out to be Robert Galbraith.

THE schooner "Annie B." was lost at Ship Harbor, Nova Scotia, on Monday night. She was bound from this city to New York with a cargo of 3,000 bushels of potatoes. She left on the 29th of November, got ashore at Ship Harbor, and will become a total wreck. The "Annie B." was 96 tons register, was built at Greenwich, K. C., in 1872, and was owned by Mr. Thomas Bogle, of Greenwich, and Capt. Secord. She was partially insured.

WITH a great flourish the Grit press have been circulating throughout the land that in consequence of the coming introduction of the national policy, the price of home-made grey cottons had been advanced 17 1/2 per cent. The Guelph Herald has made inquiries, and finds that instead of putting up the prices, the Canadian mills have actually reduced them from a quarter to three-quarters of a cent per yard, since the elections in September.

THE Hon. P. Fortin's majority in Gaspé was 794. But for a severe snow storm, which prevented electors from coming out, the majority would have been much larger. We congratulate the Hon. gentlemen upon the splendid triumph, and we congratulate the country upon having again given its confidence to its old representative, than whom no public man in Canada has exhibited a more earnest and unselfish devotion to the interests of his country. This election settles Mr. Flynn's chances. Gaspé has recovered quickly from its momentary forgetfulness.—Montreal Gazette.

YESTERDAY a child of Mr. James Heartz, of this city, was severely injured, and narrowly escaped death, by falling down a flight of stairs. Upon the arrival of Dr. Creamer, who was immediately sent for, it was found that the child's shoulder was out of joint. The Dr., however, very skillfully reduced the dislocation, and in a remarkably short space of time the child was at rest.
