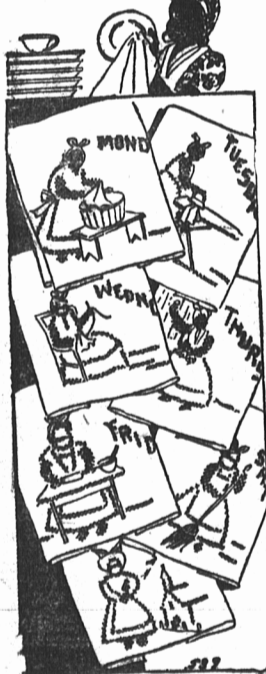

There are now no less than 994 Boy Scout units in public, secondary, elementary and other schools, universities and training colleges of Great Britain.

The 600 Boy Scouts of Saskatoon have on request accepted the responsibility this summer of protecting the trees on the city's boulevards from the damage suffered in previous years. An unexpected tribute to Boy Scout training published recently was that of Madam Krupskaya-Lenin, wife of the Russian leader. Writing thirteen years ago she declared: "The chief thing that English Boy Scouting gives to their children is a life of romantic and decorative colour; does no violence to a child's free will; gives scope to its initiative and self-reliance; broadens its horizon, makes its life full and rich, and to a high degree develops its social habits."

Sir Percy Everett is Deputy Commissioner of Imperial Headquarters of the Boy Scouts Association, was associated with Lord Baden-Powell in the historically famous first experimental Boy Scout camp, held in 1907, and played an important part in developing the plan of organization by the Boy Scouts Association.

The trees were planted under the direction of the Ontario Forestry Branch as part of the programme of the 10th Annual Scout Forestry Camp at Angus. Some 45,000 trees were also planted in the now well established Scout Forest, bringing the total stand of trees in the project to 750,000. The work was done by 147 selected Scouts coming from all parts of the province. There is keen competition to attend the camps, notwithstanding that each boy pays a camp fee and other expenses.

Faulty Air Valve Held Likely Cause Of Sub Disaster

PORTSMOUTH, N.H., June 19—(AP)—Beneath the closed hatches of a sister submarine, Lieut. Oliver F. Naquin reenacted for a Naval Inquiry Board today the operations his submarine, the Squaw, prior to her fatal plunge to the ocean bottom almost a month ago. Earlier, as high ranking officers in full-dress opened the investigation at Portsmouth Navy Yard,

the first witness testified that a faulty air induction valve might have allowed tons of water to pour into the Squaw, which still holds 26 of her men entombed in 240 feet of water 15 miles off this port. Suspicions of sabotage were voiced, meanwhile, from widely separated sectors. Henry Ford sold a group of farm camp boys at Detroit that he believed all three recent submarine disasters—the Squaw, the Thetis, the Phoenix—were caused "by sabotage," while at Washington, Senator David I. Walsh (Dem.-Massachusetts) chairman of the Senate Naval Affairs Committee, declared the triple sinking, all within one month, "prompts the inquiry that these are more than coincidence."

FRESH STRIFE IN PALESTINE

18 Deaths In Bomb Explosion At Haifa.

JERUSALEM, June 19—British troops aided by airplanes killed nine terrorists in a battle near Jericho today as a fresh outbreak of Jewish-Arab strife caused 18 deaths in Haifa's market place.

The encounter between the troops and the terrorists had followed an early morning bomb explosion which killed nine men, six women and three children in the Haifa market place. Twenty four persons were wounded. Eighty-eight persons died in similar explosions and subsequent Arab-Jewish fighting at the market place in July, 1938. Arab crowds in Government Hospital morgue at Haifa tonight in search of relatives among the bomb-torn victims of today's explosion. Authorities said they believed the bombs were brought into the city from outlying districts and concealed in vegetable baskets. An unidentified Jew was beaten

and stabbed in a mid-day street fight. Additional bombs exploded today in the mixed quarter on the Jaffa-Tel Aviv border, just outside the Jaffa police headquarters. There was no immediate report of casualties in these blasts. KINGSTON, Jamaica, June 19—(AP Cable)—Jamaica on Kingston's strike-torn waterfront relaxed to night but armed police still patrolled the town after a series of disturbances broke out over the weekend. Thousands attended the funeral today of Hezkie Robinson, unemployed chauffeur, shot in a clash with police Sunday. Robinson's death was the only fatality since waterfront strike began last week.
