Chimes at St. Paul's Are Temporarily Silent

Charlottetown residents depending on St. Paul's chimes for time checks may find themselves late for work these mornings. They were installed shortly after World War II by the late Hon. George DeLois, in memory of his son, Gordon, killed in action Dec. 27, 1913.

The mechanism was shut out last Sunday because of a defect in the electrical system which caused a siren-like shriek to accompany the sound of the bells. It was feared the entire mechanism would be damaged, so it was shut off to await service from an electrical company from Quebec, when its electricians reach the city on one of their routine service checks. The chimes, which have lent a flavor to city life for many years, also send the sound of bells throughout the city before 1 p.m. and 5.30 each day.

No Danger Of Drought Here But Moisture Needed Soon

Prince Edward Island is not in danger of having a drought as is being expected by New England and other parts of the south western United States, says a man who should know. Although the total amount of rainfall has been down this year in comparison with other years, Warren Burns of the Meteorological Section of the P.E.I. Experimental Farm said yesterday. "The vegetation has been suffering, but we will never get to the stage of a drought. There will always be a reserve. "What we need now is some rain or snow before the ground freezes. If we were to have a hard freeze, the ground would be frozen to any depth when the snow melted it would not be able to penetrate the frozen ground, and the soil would be as dry as a desert," he said. "The farmer's fields will be in good shape, but it will be difficult to haul water from streams or ponds for their livestock. The effects on crops won't be seen until next year, but if we have a dry winter it might be serious."

(Continued from Page 1) other ridings and other provinces. With sympathy for the point of view that has been advanced for the respective traditions, I feel it would be unwise to adopt this amendment. I would serve to put not only the members of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island on a par of a hot seat, but indirectly the commissions in other provinces."

Mr. Barnett said: "But the House listened with more attention to the argument advanced by the two Queens' Representatives than it did to the one from Nova Scotia. It was not attempting to prejudice what the P.E.I. redistricting commission should do. But they argued that the commission should have the right to decide the final ridings should be retained."

"Perhaps the commission will be abolishing them all, perhaps they will not. But I think it unfortunate if at this stage we were to legislate two existing ridings out of existence," Mr. MacQuarrie said.

KINGS TOO SMALL? Transport Minister J. W. Pickersill, who piloted the legislation through the Commons, said he had the impression that Kings County, with a 25 per cent tolerance, would be a viable riding, and a population to be a constituency without some change in boundary.

"So the historic riding of Queens will not remain the historic riding of Queens if the law is carried out," Mr. Pickersill pointed out. "Probably Prince County has too large a population for the existing arrangement. I am a little troubled about delegating a legislative power of this kind to the commission, but I think it is quite right to tell these commissioners that in two cases, preserve their dual constituencies in the new boundaries."
