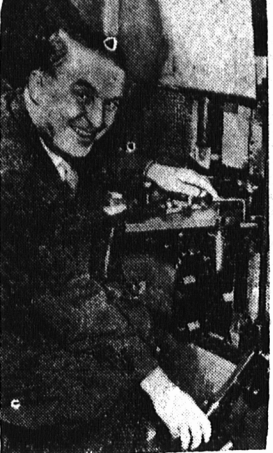

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Cobalt Bomb For Hospital At Edmonton

EDMONTON, Jan. 1 (CP)—A cobalt bomb—the gift of two Calgary business men—will be installed at the Provincial Cancer Clinic in Edmonton. It is expected to be at work within six months on the treatment of deep-seated cancers.

Premier Manning announced Wednesday that the \$55,000 radioactive cancer therapy machine has been donated by Mervyn (Red) Dutton, former National Hockey League player and manager, and Reginald F. Jennings. They gave it in memory of their fathers who were cancer sufferers.

Installation of the cobalt unit will launch the Provincial Clinic on a program of cancer treatment by radiation therapy. Hitherto it has concentrated on determining whether patients have cancer or not. Then it turned them over to hospitals for X-ray, surgical or other treatment.

Nfld. Baby Canada's First

CORNER BROOK, Nfld., Jan. 1 (CP)—A baby boy born here two minutes after midnight NST appears to be Canada's first of the New Year.

Both mother, Mrs. Mable Arnold, and baby, as yet un-named, were reported in fine condition. The Arnolds live in Corner Brook East.

Because of Newfoundland's time zone advantage—the New Year here comes half an hour before it does in the Maritimes—babies born in the province have a half-hour handicap in trying for New Year's honours.

The first Nova Scotia baby appeared to be another boy, the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Paton of Birch Cove. Weighing in at six pounds, one ounce, he was born one minute after midnight AST—28 minutes later in the New Year than the Newfoundland contender when time zones are considered.

Despirito Aims At New Record

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 1 (AP)—Tony Despirito, all-time champion jockey with 390 winners last year begins the new year with another ambition—to be the leading rider at Tropical Park's current meeting.

Despirito, who broke the record when he booted home his 389th winner Tuesday and added another yesterday, had planned to take a rest after the new year. But he changed his mind and now wants to beat out Charlie Burr for riding honors at the 40-day meeting.

Burr, who was leading jockey in 1951 with 310, has won 22 since Tropical Park began a 42-day meeting last Thanksgiving Day. Despirito is second with 20.

Pushing them for riding honors at the meeting is apprentice Charles O'Brien with 18, Sam Boulmetis with 17 and Kenny Church, who has 16.

Despirito had eight mounts yesterday but had to be satisfied with one win aboard Satisfied. That was in the first race. After that the best he could do was one second, four thirds and two out of the money.

His score for the year: Mounts, 1,482; firsts, 390; seconds, 247; thirds, 212; out, 633; Pct. 26.

The record of 388 which Despirito tied and then smashed was set by Walter Miller in 1906 and tied by Joe Culmone and Willie Shoemaker in 1950.

Danny Nardico Wins TKO Over Jake LaMotta

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 1 (AP)—Danny Nardico looked for a shot at the lightweight title today after stunning former middleweight champion Jake LaMotta with a technical knockout in eight rounds.

Nardico, 11 to 5 underdog from Tampa, Fla., wants to fight Archie Moore for the crown. The International Boxing Club said before the bout Wednesday night that the winner would be in line for a title bout. However, Moore is under contract to give Joey Maxim a chance to regain the crown he lost last Dec. 17.

Nardico was ahead in the eyes of both judges and the referee when he floored LaMotta early in the seventh round with a right. It was the first time in his career that LaMotta had been put down. LaMotta regained his feet and Nardico drove him to a corner and hammered him furiously. Jake staggered to his corner at the bell.

A Boxing Commission doctor examined LaMotta and the Bronx battler's seconds yelled to referee Billy Regan: "That's all."

Regan and judges Mark Erwin and Jerry Sherrard all had Nardico leading by 69-62 when the fight ended.

The fight drew only 3,318 fans and a gross gate of \$14,378.

Nardico, 25, weighed 177; LaMotta 173.
