

Four Rinks In Running For Curling Championship At Confederation 'Spiel

Four rinks remain in the running for the Maritime Central Airways Trophy, emblematic of the curling championship at the Confederation Bouspiel underway in Charlottetown.

The Confederation Bouspiel champions will be declared some time this evening. One of the championship skips will be Hon. T. A. Campbell, Chief Justice of the Province. Frank Acorn of Charlottetown; Jim Vance of Moncton; or F. A. Folland of Summerside.

The championship competitions started last night at 9:30 in the first round of the curling championship. The Hon. T. A. Campbell rink eliminated the Dr. E. S. Giddings rink 13-5 while the Frank Acorn rink eliminated the H. Atkinson rink by an identical 13-5 score.

At the same time Vance defeated J. F. MacLeod 14-4 and Folland defeated W. R. MacNeill 11-6.

The Acorn and Campbell rinks

will meet in one bracket of the semi-finals this morning while Folland will play against Vance. The finals will be played this afternoon.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Pitcher Robin Roberts refused his 1954 contract back to Philadelphia Phillies Tuesday with a claim he doesn't think he should have to take a pay cut.

Roberts wouldn't discuss the figures on the contract, except to say that the pay cut did not amount to \$5,000. Most guesses here have been that he got in the neighborhood of \$40,000 last year.

Roberts won 28, lost seven in 1952, and had a 23-18 record last year when he ran into difficulty toward the end of the season.

"I don't think there's any reason why I should be expected to take any less in 1954," he said.

Charles 3-to-1 Favorite In Bout Tonight

CHICAGO (AP)—Ezzard Charles, former heavyweight champion close to a shot at Rocky Marciano in a 3-to-1 favorite to dispose of Bob Satterfield in a 10-rounder which seems unlikely to go the distance at Chicago Stadium tonight.

Satterfield, a boxing enigma, either knocks out his man or gets knocked out himself in a hurry.

It has been rumored that if Charles defeats Satterfield convincingly he would be matched with Marciano in a June title bout.

Satterfield has a 32-14-2 record with 25 knockout victories and being knocked out nine times himself. Of his 48 pro fights, only 14 went the route.

Charles, at 32, is about as near a chance for a bout with Marciano as he will ever be. The Cincinnati Negro at 188 will have a six-pound weight pull over Satterfield, listed as a light heavyweight.
