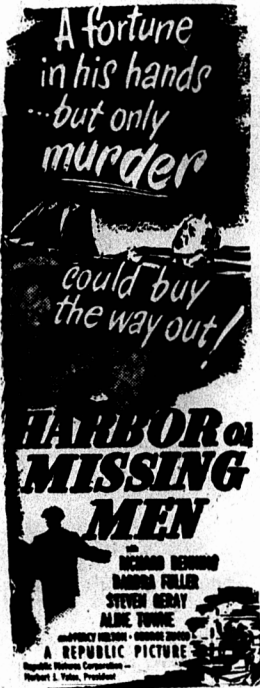

Sunday School Convention Held At Montague

Georgetown district Sunday School convention was held in Montague Baptist Church, instead of Lower Montague as first planned on Wednesday, October 25th. The afternoon session began at 3 o'clock with five Sunday Schools represented.

Dr. A. D. MacKenzie opened the afternoon session. Hymn No. 26 was held followed by prayer.

Dr. MacKenzie spoke of a green spot on the Prairies where the few trees by a lake which overflowed in the spring, with roots set deep, became sturdy and strong. And so young lives when their roots were set deep in Christian living as taught in the homes and Sunday Schools by teachers with understanding of the needs of young lives would stand firm for the kingdom. "I Am So Glad That Our Father in Heaven" by Greta Wigginton was then enjoyed. Mrs. Charles Fraser was the organist. This period was closed with a hymn. Mr. William MacLeod of Valleyfield introduced the speaker, Rev. J. B. Wilson, secretary of the M. R. E. C.

He then called for the minutes by Mrs. Davis White. The financial report showed receipts were down.

Rev. Mr. Wilson asked why children do not go to Sunday School. The answer was suggested that the parents didn't have interest enough to send their children. He said he listened to a great preacher who talked to 1,000 or more children. He said that "we must write each and every child or pupil on our heart and take them to the throne of God in prayer."

Evening Session The evening session began at 7:30 with the worship service in charge of Valleyfield. Scripture lesson was contained in First John, chapter 12. A hymn was then sung and a duet sweetly rendered by Mrs. W. A. Bruce and Miss Irene Bruce, Valleyfield, "Lead Me To Calvary".

Rev. Mr. Fraser of Valleyfield briefly stressed leadership to the young people so that they will be fitted for positions later on. This can be only accomplished through the Sunday School. He spoke of the example that Sunday School teachers set to their pupils and that these examples affect their lives at some time.

Rev. J. B. Wilson spoke on the M. R. E. C., which is the Maritime Religious Education Council, and their work promoting teen age and Sunday School work in the Maritimes. He told of the annual Sunday School convention held in Nova Scotia.

Council And Rink Building Committee Meet

...A meeting of the Mayor and Council and the Building Committee of the Recreational Center was held in the Council Chambers, Georgetown on Wednesday, October 25th. Mayor P. L. Boudreau presided and the minutes were read by Captain C. M. Fitzgerald, Town Clerk.

The question of insurance coverage on the Recreational Center was thoroughly discussed and satisfactorily settled. A financial statement covering the summer and autumn activities of the Community Welfare League was presented by league president, F. J. Solomon.

It was decided to call tenders for parties desirous of operating the canteen and lunch counter in the rink for the coming season and the tenders will be posted in the immediate future and will close on December 2nd. It was decided to have some grading done to the ground on the ice space in the rink and also to install several box drains to allow drainage of water from the rink in the spring. The promenade floor will be covered with heavy roofing material before the skating and hockey season starts. This will stop the draught and add to the comfort of the patrons. A lengthy discussion took place on the question of the erection of a shed to house horses. This would be erected in the vicinity of the rink. It was decided that during the next few weeks that efforts will be made to ascertain the cost of the erection or purchase of such a shed.
