Convicts Are Recaptured. CAMPBELL'S BAY, Que., Aug. 23.—Provincial police announced today that Walter Piche and Robert Smith, the two men who slugged a couple of guards and last night, had been recaptured near here and returned to their cells.

"HEALTH IS WEALTH" FOOD TEST

Two Cambridge scientists, hundreds of parents and nearly a thousand children have taken part in a research which may have an important bearing on the feeding and health of Britain's children. The investigation was to find what the children of the wealthy and middle classes eat.

There are, at present, no scientific data to show the connection between food and health in homes where there is no shortage of money. The inquiry has taken five years and the results are now being worked out. Parents were lent scales and were asked to weigh at the table every helping of food they served to their children and to enter figures on a chart.

Every child was medically examined for weight, height, and tested for anaemia and deficiency in iron.

Stands Solidly Behind Britain Say McCullagh

LONDON, Aug. 23—Canada will stand solidly behind Great Britain in event of war, C. George McCullagh, president and publisher of the Toronto Globe and Mail, told the Daily Telegraph today.

All sections of the population would spring to arms, he said. War would find Canada's mineral wealth as well as man-power immediately and automatically at the disposal of Britain.

McCullagh said it would not be regarded as a case in which Canada was pulling Britain's chestnuts out of the fire, for the feeling in the Dominion is "we would be playing a definite part in preserving civilization as we know, understand and love it."

The publisher said Prime Minister Mackenzie King had not announced a general election date because "he knows if the threat of war materializes, Canada will be in it and domestic problems will disappear overnight."

MERE MALE TOPS IN PETIT POINT

CAPE TOWN, Aug. 24—(C.P.—Toby Kerman, secretary of a leading South African lecturer, has the strangest hobby and he is proud of it. He works portraits and scenes in petit point.

Wanting an outlet for an artistic longing which was smothered at the age of eight when he discovered he could not master drawing or painting, he began copying pictures in needlework.

Now after 20 years, his petit point pictures are ranked among the finest on the world. He has made pictures of both Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth and presented them to their Majesties. He works with silk on linen without drawing even an outline of his picture.

A picture three feet by two feet takes 500 hours, or a year, to do. Some of his sketches on the linen are over only one thread. They are so minute that they are hardly visible to the naked eye. He used as many as 12 different silks to work an eye.

He took several of his pictures with him to America for exhibition. He was offered \$1,000 (\$4,700) for a copy of the first Queen Elizabeth's death mask, but he refused to sell as he works as a hobby and not for profit.

PEACH TURNOVERS
