SUMMERSIDE — Charles O. Bartlett, biologist with the Canadian wild life service, Sackville, N.B., was guest speaker at the meeting of the East Prince Fish Game Association last evening at the A.C. Club rooms, Summerside. Howard Wall presided.

Mr. Bartlett showed a group of slides taken during surveys of water flow populations carried out each year in the province and gave members an interesting commentary during which he related some of the habits, types of breeding areas, various habits and the percentages of the waterfowl population each breed carried.

At the conclusion of the showing, Mr. Bartlett told the fish and game members "If we're going to get back to high quality hunting we have to think about our breeding areas." He added that he felt much could be done in this field through ARDA.

Bartlett also introduced the secretary, Lovell Huestis and thanked by the president for the showing. He also made brief discussions were held on several items including the proposed amendments to the act at Summerside. It was decided to allot \$20 to assist in the purchase of a scholarship fund.

Special thanks was extended to Albert Gallant, Jr. and Truman James Jeffery who sold between them, over 300 memberships during the evening.

Dr. Allan Roesler, national director of the Canadian Association for Retarded Children, was the guest speaker at the dinner meeting of the provincial association held last night at the Clover Club.

The meeting was chaired by Roy Smallman and he also introduced the speaker.

Dr. Roesler commended the provincial association in its work for the retarded children on the island, with its projects as education programs, camping programs and the Sherwood Hospital and said the island association compares very favorably with the other provinces.

He spoke of the change in attitude of the public towards the mentally retarded over the last decade and the change in attitude of the parents of retarded children too. Parents, he said, are no longer thinking that institutionalization is the only answer to their child's problem and they are openly discussing the problem with other members of their branches of the Canadian Association for Retarded Children.

Fisheries Institute Urged By Committee

A technical institute of fisheries, "from which we might expect a stream of technicians who would contribute to the building of a modern Canadian fishing industry," was recommended by the select standing committee on fisheries in the Legislature yesterday.

The committee's report, signed by chairman Thomas Curran (P-C-2nd Kings), placed "prime emphasis on its recommendation that a technical institute be established in the province of Prince Edward Island."

According to the committee, a program of fisheries is to be undertaken by the province to translate into practical application the findings of fisheries research scientists. "Even the small amount of study on this problem which could be undertaken by the committee indicates the continuing lack of technicians for the fishing industry," it said.

"The committee believes that such personnel would have to be trained in a specialized facility centrally provided for all the Atlantic provinces. It believes, furthermore, that this would in no way interfere with the training of fishermen which is being done by the P.E.I. Fisheries Federation; that a committee of industry and government be appointed to look into the possibility of a co-ordinated program of fisheries products in a suitable fisheries pavilion at provincial fairs."

Also, that effort be made to have ice survey flights made from Charlottetown so that information on ice conditions can be provided at the earliest moment for the widest area; and that the policy of paying roads to fishermen contracts be continued.
