IN MEMORIAM

JOHN J. H. HANSEN

The death occurred at Georgetown on Tuesday, September 11th of John James Henry Hansen in his 89th year, following an illness of several months.

In his passing Georgetown and surrounding area has lost one of its eldest and most highly respected citizens. The late Mr. Hansen was born in Eouhant Island in 1862 and resided there till he was six years of age, when with his parents, he took up residence in nearby Burnt Point, where he continued to make his home until about a month and a half ago, at which time he moved into Georgetown.

From an early age he combined the labours of harvesting the products of the sea and the soil. At the age of 12 years he commenced a long and eventful career as a lobster fisherman and without missing a fishing season, he was actively engaged in this pursuit, for sixty two consecutive years.

During those years he was a part of and a witness to the many changes which, in the course of its development, took place in the lobster fishing industry.

An interesting conversationalist, he could speak with authority and experience on such developments as the change over from sail and hand-dory practice to the gasoline engine powered craft; from the old-time practice of estimating the catch by the actual count of lobsters caught to the present weight method; from the tedious and exacting procedure of the hand-sealing of cans to the present modern way.

Well known to him were the locations, on our coast, of many large lobster processing plants, which for years have been in disuse or disappeared altogether. The lobster fishing grounds, at the mouth of the Cardigan River, off-shore from his home, have been for years and will for as long as lobsters are fished in this area, be known as the "Hansen Ground."

Being of Danish descent, the deceased possessed a love of the soil, second only to his great love of the sea and during his life time he divided his labours between the two.

Though for some years he has been unable to follow all the strenuous duties of the farm, he nevertheless kept up all his interests in the industry and its developments. He was a great reader of the many publications of our day and followed world events with an interest seldom seen in a man of his years.

One of his hobbies, which he practiced religiously, was the keeping of a diary, covering local events, climate and items of interest. Twice married, his wives both predeceased him.

He leaves to mourn, one son, Nelson, in Charlottetown and two daughters, Katherine, (Mrs. William Simmonds) of Sea View, and Jessie (Mrs. Harry Simmonds) of Charlottetown.

The largely attended funeral was held on Thursday, September 13th at 2:30 p.m. from the home of his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Nelson W. Hansen. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. William A. Patterson, pastor of St. David's United Church, Georgetown.

The pall-bearers were, George Mair, Michael Burke Sr., Joseph Johnson, William S. Martell, Guy Hemphill and Albert King.
