CHANGED HANDS.—The Pioneer says that Mr. John McDonald, of Summerside, has sold Midnight (2.52) to Mr. George Essory for a good figure.

FOR THE FIRST TIME.—The new Souris Presbyterian Church bell was tolled for the dead for the first time last week at the funeral of the late Wm. Maskell.

RIDEAU RANGE.—It is stated that the Minister of Militia has intimated his intention of renewing the lease of Rideau Rifle Range for a further term of five years.

KING'S COUNTY.—King's will give a good account of itself on the 30th, as at last local election there will be but one Grit returned,—the last rose of summer left blooming alone.

A VALUABLE CARGO.—The steamer Halifax sailed from Halifax on Wednesday, with a cargo valued at over \$150,000. For want of room the bulk of about 800 barrels was left over for next trip.

DIPHTHERIA IN CAPE BRETON.—The schools at Port Hastings, C. B., have closed on account of a malignant type of diphtheria. Several houses have been quarantined to prevent its spreading.

ANOTHER LIBEL SUIT.—A Toronto despatch says that the Mail Printing Co., through Mr. Hunting, managing director, has instituted proceedings for libel against David Creighton, publisher and manager of the Empire newspaper, on account of charges of conspiracy to injure Canada, treason, etc., which have been made lately in the Empire against the Mail. Criminal proceedings for libel have also been instituted against Creighton at the instance of Editor Farrar, of the Mail.

SAVINGS BANK.—The official statement of post office savings banks for the month of December shows the deposits during the month were \$55,207; withdrawals, \$767,899; transfers from Dominion government savings banks, \$22,358,923; balance at credit of Depositors, \$22,496,735. There was deposited in Dominion government savings banks during December \$501,584, amount withdrawn, \$594,654, and balance remaining on December 31st, \$19,223,611.

A LATIN MISQUOTATION.—The Parliamentary correspondent of the Montreal Gazette reports: The Senate sat this afternoon with closed doors for a few minutes discussing what was believed to be a breach of privilege of the Upper House. Hon. Mr. Haythorne, in his speech upon the address, used the Latin quotation locus in quo. It was reported correctly, but some conscientious compositor and some evil willed proof-reader made it locus in ano, hence the trouble. Some wicked wag says this is the result of attempting to add a third official language; two were as much as the printers will stand.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Portuguese Trouble.

LONDON, Jan. 26.

The Standard's Lisbon correspondent says: As Portugal has failed to obtain sympathy and support from any government in Europe, it is proposed to sound the United States as to the formulation of an alliance having for its equivalent special commercial facilities in Portuguese ports and in Africa. The tone of Blaine's recent despatches to Lisbon from the cabinet should be proof enough that the United States will not concede to the proposition.

LISBON, Jan. 26.

Dia reports rioting at Lagos, in the province of Algarve, and says that the trouble is not of Republican origin, as rumored, but arose from the disorderly conduct of a number of soldiers who forced the gates of the barracks in order to take part in a demonstration against the British ultimatum. The King of Portugal has dengue or inflammatory fever, nearly resembling the influenza. Dia reports that the government has ordered Serpa Pinto upon a mission to Western Africa, and will not permit his return to Lisbon lest the Jingo spirit may be revived.

Consulting With the Bankers.

OTTAWA, Jan. 26.

The Government had a conference yesterday with a large number of the leading bankers with respect to the proposed change in the Banking Act. The bankers offer to put up a guarantee fund equal to five per cent, of their note issue to secure circulation and also to make arrangements to redeem notes in all parts of the Dominion without discount to holders, provided present charters are continued. The Ministers promised to consider the proposal and to hold another consultation with the bankers before the bill is introduced.

The Newfoundland Fisheries.

PARIS, Jan. 26.

La Justice asks whether Flourous and all those who voted with him on the Newfoundland fisheries really desired to force war between England and France. If they do not, it says, let them act like reasonable men, alive to their responsibilities.

To Visit Montreal.

MONTREAL, Jan. 26.

The City Clerk, acting on instructions from the Council, has forwarded an invitation to the Pan-American delegates to visit Montreal some time during the month of February.

DUBLIN, Jan. 26.

The Gazette has a proclamation releasing thirteen counties, including Donegal, Kerry and Limerick from the operation of the Coercion Act.

News Notes.

The prohibition bill now under discussion in the South Dakota Legislature is described as the most stringent measure of the class ever drawn up. It is the joint production of the State League and the W. C. T. U., and so restrictive are its provisions that it even forbids the sale of wine for sacramental purposes. This has drawn out a protest from Bishop Hare, of Sioux Falls, head of the Episcopal Church, who calls it a wrongful interference with the church's rights, and is using his influence to have it amended. It is somewhat doubtful if the State voted decidedly in support of his contentions. The people of the State voted decidedly for prohibition when the state constitution was adopted, and the temperance associations are exerting their power to make it thorough.

PAINFUL ACCIDENT.—A very painful accident occurred at Wellington Station on Thursday afternoon last, to a man by the name of David Cameron, who is about 50 years of age. When the west-bound train reached Wellington the pay-car was there and it was desired to take it on behind. The car which was on the siding was consequently backed down on the main line, and before backing the train down to connect with the pay-car, the conductor, who desired to continue on when passing the station, gave the usual warning of "all aboard" several times before the train moved. Mr. Cameron, who had been talking to someone on the station platform, wished to jump on the train, as he lived a short distance up the track, but unfortunately in some way he slipped and his left leg went under the wheels, with the result that it was smashed below the knee, several car-wheels having passed over it. The injured man was taken to Summerside, where the leg was amputated by Dr. Jarvis, assisted by Dr. Gillis. Cameron is reported "doing well."—Pioneer.

GENTLEMEN.—Thanking you for the liberal support you have given me in the last three General Elections, and having again been nominated a candidate for the representation of your interests in the House of Assembly, I now seek your suffrages.

After the promotion of the Hon. W. W. Sullivan to a seat on the Supreme Court Bench of this Province, His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor entrusted me with the formation of a Government.

Having accomplished the formation of a Government, it was deemed proper, in view of the number of partial elections required to be held in consequence of the vacancies created and the nearness of the completion of the term of the present Parliament, to consult the electors by means of a General Election before entering on new legislation.

Agriculture being the main industry of the Province, measures will be adopted which will best render the labor of the husbandman remunerative, by increasing the aid given to the Annual Exhibitions, by the importation of improved stock, and by providing instruction on Agricultural Chemistry and a course of popular lectures on agricultural subjects.

In order to give greater shipping facilities, and until the Dominion Government shall have taken over all the wharves that became the property of the Dominion Government at the time of Confederation, it is our policy to keep in repair such of them as are essential to the trade of the locality where they are respectively built.

As in the past, our policy is to vigorously press to a settlement our claims against the Federal Government.

Rigorous economy will be practiced in the expenditure of public money, while at the same time liberal provision will be made for the public service.

Pending the adjustment of our claims against the Federal Government, our annual resources may not be sufficient to carry out the proposals indicated, and at the same time provide for the large expenditure required for our educational system. In that case, such measures to supplement our revenue will be adopted as will bear the least heavily on the people, and will at the same time be just and equitable.

Changes will be made in the public service in order to secure efficiency and greater security to the public interests.
