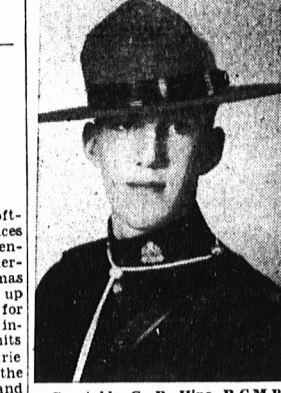

Managing director George C. Hendrie reported no new developments in the expansion plans since the original announcement June 30. Construction of the new track depends on the sale of Woodbine Park to the City of Toronto for a housing development and purchase of a new site.

Erskine, who threw his no-hitter against the Cubs, never got anybody out. The Cubs lowered the boom on relief Joe Black for three runs in the fourth after Snider's homer had tied the score 4-4 in the third.
