IN THIS CORNER!

Island Baseball League officials came up with the biggest boot of the baseball season yesterday when they suddenly, unceremoniously and maybe even without too much meditation decided that the time had come to end the League schedule. The fact that there was a game scheduled for Memorial Field last night and that quite a few people would turn out to see the proposed game apparently didn't concern the officials too much for they didn't even take time to notify the fans or one of the teams concerned about their sudden decision.

On top of that the leading league officials didn't even notify some of their fellow executive members about their sudden actions. For example the League's vice president, Russell St. John, had not been informed yesterday evening about the cessation of ball games. Neither representatives on the Junior or Intermediate Abbies had heard a word about the new proposal, and the Junior Abbies who were supposed to meet the Curran & Briggs Juniors here last night, had their baseball team on the field before they heard that the League schedule had been closed. Roy McCabe of M.C.A. received a teletype message from Summerside about the proposed suggestion and the message was not understandable.

The schedule apparently was declared closed some time yesterday afternoon by a vote of the Summerside Intermediates, Curran & Briggs Juniors and the R.C.A.F. Royals. League President Joe Hunter evidently reasoned that since each team had made three trips to every other team's diamond the League would thus end on even terms. In addition there are only six games to be played and it was possibly felt that the outcome of these games would not change the standings.

We haven't too much kick about the early closing of the schedule but only in the manner in which it was done. The Abegweit Athletic Club however, have a legitimate kick. They have been done out of four ball games and they estimate that they have lost about \$200 as a result. George Francis, manager of the Memorial Field lighting system could well use that \$200 in the payment for the installation of the lights.

The decision was a rough one for the baseball fans of Charlottetown. Quite a number turned out yesterday evening to see the game which had been billed as the last of the regular schedule between two junior clubs and they expected to see a pretty fair ball game with Benny Carson and Ed Buckley opposing one another on the mound. For a league that should be wooing the fans it wasn't exactly smart business.

It should also be a disappointment to the players who were fighting for the League's batting crown. Several players were in the running for the top position and although there is no reward in a material sense for winning the batting crown there is a lot of satisfaction and prestige attached to it. With six games left it stands now the batting honors are shared between Stan Richard of the Air Force and Mark Delaney of Holman's. Jack Ready, who had two games to play, might very well have topped both players.

The Junior Abbies were disappointed Coach Randy Edwards had them out on the field ready for the game when they learned that it was all off. Efforts to get in touch with the Summerside Juniors coach proved unfruitful when Abegweit officials were told that he was on his way to the States, possibly with two of his players, for the Old Home Week holidays.

Marlene Stewart Has Long Lead In Women's Close Golf Tourney

LONDON (CP)—Marlene Stewart, the pudgy little golfing miss from Fonthill, Ont., Thursday night all but wrapped up her third straight Canadian women's golf championship. Her opening-round five-under-par 71 gave her a booming six-stroke lead over the rest of the field, the cream of Canada's feminine golfing world.

It didn't take the 19-year-old smiling-eyed Miss Stewart long to give notice that she would be the one to beat in the tournament of the Memorial Field lighting system that has attracted a field of 100 or more from Nova Scotia to British Columbia. She opened with a birdie four in the 405-yard first hole and went out in 33, by far the best of the day.

There's another 36 holes in the medal play tournament and, based on the opening day's play, there isn't a shot in the big field who would give her too much trouble.

It was a big day all around for Marlene and the championship itself. The 71 was the lowest competitive score posted by Miss Stewart and also the lowest in 27-year history of the tournament. She also was the first woman to crack the par-76 figure over the 5,998 yard Sunningdale Golf and Country Club layout.

In addition, Mrs. Grace Reeves, a member of the Sunningdale club and just another name in the championship's history, scored a hole in one the first time in the tournament history an ace had been scored. The London woman did it.

Duck hunters in Prince Edward Island will be allowed a daily bag limit of eight ducks during the 1953 hunting season, according to an announcement made by Resources Minister Robert Winters.

This bag limit does not include mergansers. Five geese, eight Wilson's snipe and eight woodcock may also be taken each day in this province.

Open seasons throughout the Province will be as follows (all dates inclusive): Ducks (other than Wood Ducks) and Geese (other than Brant): October 10 to December 5.
