

The Stomach

The walls of the stomach are thin and elastic, and may be temporarily dilated by overmuch food, or by gas generated by the decomposition of food.

But the stomach may become permanently dilated, and enormously so. In the latter case, the two openings—the entrance and the exit—may be so affected as to make it difficult for it to eject the food into the intestines.

The muscular walls of a dilated stomach are weakened. This causes the food to remain too long in it—sometimes several days. The food thus retained decomposes into a number of irritating acids and annoying gases.

Such dilatation may be due to a diseased narrowing of the pylorus, the opening by which the food passes from the stomach, or to its obstruction by tumors of various kinds, thus hindering the passage of the food through it.

Habitual overeating also causes this dilatation. All persons are liable to it who overload their stomachs with either food or liquids, especially with beer.

This dilatation is frequent in children, especially those fed artificially. But it is not confined to them. Many mothers nurse their children at night continuously. Such infants have good appetites, for their food does not duly nourish them, but they are badly troubled with indigestion, colic and diarrhoea.

It is the same with adults, though the muscular tone of the stomach may be strengthened by tonics. The worst cases require the doctor.—Youth's Companion.
