Saint John Ruggers Win Series Holding Abbies To 3-All Tie In Game Here

Charlottetown Abegweits and Saint John Ruggers battled to a three-all tie in a rugged football game Saturday afternoon at Memorial Field. The Ruggers by the virtue of their 14-0 at Saint John, the previous weekend, took the home and home total point series 17-3. They now advance to meet the Nova Scotia winners in McCurdy Cup play.

The Abbies showed a reversal of form from their first game with the Ruggers and it was two even-matched teams that booted, tackled and fought to gain the advantage. A sluggish field made it treacherous underfoot and a greasy ball was not conducive to easy handling.

Facing an overwhelming deficit as result of the Saint John game, the Abbies nevertheless stormed to the attack from the stubborn defence thrown up by the Saint

John squad combined to frustrate the efforts of the locals. Towards the end of the first half, which went scoreless, the visitors rallied and for a time gave their opponents and followers anxious moments.

Members of both squads suffered injuries. J. Boudreau and B. Wilson, Saint John three-quarters, required replacements. Wilson was believed to have suffered a slight concussion. George Scantlebury of the Abbies was removed from the game midway through the second half with an injured ankle. C. Ready incurred a leg injury but was able to continue.

Puck Scoring 325th Goal Will Be Sent To Queen Elizabeth

MONTREAL, Nov. 9.—(CP)—Maurice (Rocket) Richard broke the National Hockey League's all-time individual scoring record Saturday night and the puck with which he scored his 325th goal will be gold-plated and sent to Queen Elizabeth.

The flaming Rocket backhanded a shot past Al Rollins of the Chicago Black Hawks at 10:01 of the second period. The goal gave Montreal Canadiens a 4-2 lead and they went on to defeat the Hawks, 6-4.

Frank Selke, managing director of the Canadiens, announced the puck will be presented to Her Majesty.

The Queen, then Princess Elizabeth, and her husband, Prince Philip, were spectators at a N. H. L. game against New York Rangers here during the royal tour a little more than a year ago.

On one flat surface of the puck will be a likeness of the Queen and Prince Philip, together with the date of the Montreal-New York game they witnessed. On the other will be a likeness of Richard, together with the date of his record-breaking goal. Around the edges likenesses of the players on the team will be reproduced.

Selke recalled that the Queen was particularly interested in the play of Richard, about whose scoring prowess she had been told.

He also recalled that "the boys of both teams had been told to lay off the rough stuff." Later, said Selke, Her Majesty was told about a particularly rousing brawl between Canadiens and Toronto Maple Leafs, during which Richard knocked Bill Juzda out with one punch.

"And, do you know," related Selke, "when the Queen saw an amateur game in Charlottetown she told coach Leo Lamoureux, a former Canadian, she wished she had seen that big blow-up."

Richard's record-breaking, beating Nels (Ole Polson) Stewart's 324 total, came exactly 10 years to the day after the Rocket, then a raw rookie, scored his first goal.

On Nov. 8, 1942, he scored against Steve Buzinski, then goalie for New York.

Stewart toiled through 15 seasons to get his 324 total, but the sons to get his 324 total, but the seasons were shorted then. Rich-ard now is in his 11th N. H. L. campaign. Stewart played with the old Montreal Maroons, Boston Bruins and New York Americans.

Richard tied Stewart's mark Oct. 29 in Toronto against the Maple Leafs.

The other goal scorers for Canadiens last night were Dick Gamble, with two, and Floyd Curry and Paul Meger with one each.

George Gee, Fred Glover, Jim McFadden and Al Dewsbury scored for the Hawks.
