HEAVY FORGINGS.—The Nova Scotia Forge Company, of New Glasgow, shipped to Point Lewis last week the crank and shafts for the machinery of the Quebec Graving Dock, which were forged at their establishment. This is said to be the heaviest work of the kind ever done in the Dominion. One of the shafts is over 16 feet in diameter and weighs nearly four tons. The machinery for the Graving Dock is being supplied by Messrs. Corrier, Lane & Co., of Point Lewis, the firm that made the engines for the Northern Light.

CITY COUNCIL.—The business transacted at the City Council meeting last night, other than passing the accounts, was not very important. A Committee was appointed to report upon the practicability and expense of placing a much needed windmill in the tank at Spring Park; the City Collector was lectured regarding delinquents to city taxes and ordered to do his duty, and it was announced that Mr. Murdock's report on the water works would arrive and be published towards the end of the month. The meeting adjourned at 10.30.
