—CONFIRMATION SERVICE.—His Lordship Bishop Louis J. Leary, attended by Rev. R. St. John, Charlottetown and Rev. J. McIntyre, motored to Summerside on Thursday from Indian River, where he had held a Confirmation class in the morning and was the guest of Rev. J. J. Macdonald until he left Friday for Miscouche. He was met at Summerside by Rev. P. P. Arsenault, of Fifteen Point and Rev. Dr. M. Smith, of Kinkora. At five o'clock a reception was held in his Lordship's honor at the Convent where an address was read and choruses sung by the children. At 7.30 there was a procession headed by the Knights of Columbus and the Altar boys to St. Paul's Church, where a reception was held and an address from the Trustees of the parish, read by Mr. James A. McNeil, presented, followed by Benediction by Rev. J. J. Macdonald.

His Lordship addressed the people and afterwards met and shook hands with all the parishioners present some 400 or more. The proceedings for the day terminated with a reception in the Knights of Columbus Hall, where an address was also presented, Friday His Lordship celebrated Mass at St. Paul's Church at 7 o'clock. Solemn High Mass at 8 o'clock and then held Confirmation. One hundred and eighty boys and girls were confirmed by His Lordship in the presence of a very large congregation. Fathers Arsenault and McIntyre were assistants to the Bishop, Fathers Smith and St. John were Masters of Ceremonies. The sponsors for the children, J. E. Dalton and J. T. Gallant and Mrs. J. M. Noonan and Mrs. (Dr.) McPhee. The Confirmation sermon was preached by Father St. Joan after confirmation the Bishop spoke to the children and parents and gave the children a total abstinence pledge until they are twenty-one years of age.

RAISIN FUDGE

2 cups Sugar
1/2 cup water
1 stiffly beaten egg white
1/4 cup chopped Sun-Maid Raisins
1/2 cup chopped walnut meats.
1/4 teaspoon vanilla.
Boil sugar and water until it threads when dropped from the tip of a spoon. Pour on beaten egg white and beat until it holds its shape. Add raisins, nuts, salt and vanilla. Mix well. Drop from teaspoon on paraffine paper and set aside until cold.

RAISIN FUDGT

2 squares unsweetened chocolate.
2 cups sugar.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
1/4 cup milk.
1 tablespoon butter.
1/2 teaspoon vanilla.
1/2 cup Sun-Maid raisins.
Melt chocolate. Add sugar, salt and milk. Stir until mixture boils and sugar is dissolved. Cook without stirring until mixture forms a soft ball when tested in cold water. Remove from fire. Add butter and allow to stand until partially cooled. Add vanilla and raisins. Beat until creamy. Pour into buttered pan. Cut in squares. Walnuts may be added if desired.
