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S'ide Street Paving Program Well Underway

Possibly the most extensive program of street work ever undertaken is now well underway in Summerside. It includes permanent paving, preparation for paving, opening of new streets and the laying of cement sidewalks.

At the request of a Guardian reporter the whole plan was outlined yesterday by Councillor J. Lorne Driscoll, chairman of the streets committee under whose supervision the work is proceeding.

Summerside already has an enviable reputation for the quality and extent of its paved streets. In fact few towns of comparable size can boast of the high proportion of its streets that are paved and in all cases the complete width of the street is paved with proper curbing.

The new paving program, of which the first year's portion will be completed in about a month, is the part of the total street work that is creating the most interest. Two miles of streets are being paved with cement by Morrison and MacRae Ltd. The firm of Milton Hecroy Co. Ltd., of Halifax is inspecting the job and their daily reports to the Town indicate that the Town is receiving a strength of cement well above the requirements of the contract.

At present two blocks of Arcona Street from Green to Ottawa and two blocks of Green from Spring to Arcona Streets have been completed. Duke Street from the corner of Maple Avenue to Notre Dame Street is also finished. This is a street that has seen rapid growth in the last two years.

Only a few years ago the north part of it was narrow and unpaved with no sidewalk and few dwellings. Now it is paved with a cement sidewalk and is built up almost out to the Pope Road. It is now one of the finest streets in Town.

The paving of Notre Dame Street from Cedar Street to its junction with Water Street west of the street is also being built up but when completed it will provide a large section of the Town with an all weather street and will also provide a secondary entry to the Town from the west.

With this street paved it is expected to take a lot of traffic that ordinarily travels on Water Street. Paving of Upper Summer Street and Clark Street from Central Street to Summer has been commenced. Paving these streets mean that a great amount of water and sewerage installations had to be laid and now these services are available to many places such as Notre Dame Street West which did not have them previously.

Plans For Next Year
With a view to paving next year, two streets were completely rebuilt. On Harvard Street East about 500 loads of rock and about 700 loads of rock mixed with brick clay were filled in after it had been excavated. When this street is paved it will be possible for traffic to proceed directly through Town, avoiding the main street with its heavy traffic.

Duke Street from Notre Dame was given the same treatment in preparation for paving. Pond Street which is a short street between Ottawa and Harvard Streets running along the east side of the electric light pond, and was very narrow, was widened this year by filling in along the edge of the pond with about 500 loads of clay. This will give the people living there a nice wide street fronting on the pond and later a sidewalk can be laid.

In the vicinity of the new hospital several new streets have been built. In front of the hospital the street recently named Beatty Avenue goes through the former Brennan property now owned by the Town. A street also has been cut along the east side of the hospital, joining this street with Clark Street which runs in the rear of the hospital and joins Summer and Granville Streets.

About three years ago this area was all in crops or pasture but is now building up rapidly. Maple Avenue has been extended from Central Street along the south side of the Experimental Fox Franch property to where it will meet the proposed extension of Summer Street.

Premier Jones won top honors in the individual classes by virtue of his eleven firsts, eight seconds and numerous thirds and fourths. Three of his firsts were won in the male divisions, four in the female section and four in the group classes.

Lewis Brothers of York had five firsts, seven seconds, and thirds or fourths in many of the sections. Three of their firsts were in the female division and one in each of their second placings were in the male and group classes. Five of their second placings were in the female class.

Colby Lewis had two first and five seconds along with other high rankings. The Prince Edward Island Department of Agriculture had two winners, as also had Oswald J. Newson and Son of Clyde River.

The new exhibitors, Roy C. Woodside and Sons, Malpeque came through with one winner and James G. MacLean had a second and other good placings. R.L. Burge of St. Peter's Bay and Robert Chappell of York also had seconds and several other high rankings.

Judge George Rathby of Guelph, Ontario, after a long day of judging expressed his difficulty in classifying the animals because of the number and all around high quality. He was highly pleased with the showings and stated that he viewed many very useful cattle. Many breeders were unsuccessful in gaining firsts but placed well in classes throughout the day. Among them were Cecil J. Stewart and Sons, Hampshire, Earl Ward, New Wiltshire, Howard Dixon, Fortune Bridge and H.J. Kennedy, Southport.

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
