Canadian Produce for England.

When and How to Ship Apples Potatoes, Butter, &c., &c.

Compulsory Inspection of Butter an Imperative Necessity.

Concluded.

You understand, I am not complaining, but am looking to the future. Its my belief that Germany can supply both London and Liverpool with all the potatoes they need, and their's are worth more than ours. Those markets are very extensive and not easily affected. I was told that there were 3,000,000 bushels of Domestic and Foreign potatoes—in London during the month of January. I may mention that 28,000 bags of German potatoes were frozen while on the voyage over, but this did not make the slightest difference in the prices.

BUTTER.

Rep.—How did your butter sell? Mr. F.—Yes. I must not forget to tell you about the butter. I took over some 300 tubs and firkins in the *Prince Edward*. I bought it on the Island at from 14 to 16 cents per lb. It was good dairy butter, just the same as the butter you will get from any Cumberland or Antigonish farm. I had the same experience with the butter that I had with the apples. There was a large quantity of French, Belgian, Irish, and Canadian butter on the market the day I put mine on. The current prices were: French and Belgian, 135s. Best No. 1 Cork, 124s. Best Canadian Cream Dairy, 110s. to 120s. per cwt. Now, as far as quality went, my butter was fully equal to any, but it was poorly packed. In turning it out, some was white, some yellow, the rest mixed. There was too much coarse salt in some tubs, while others were not salted enough, and the result was, that though mine tasted as good and was really as good in quality as the best there, yet because of its being so poorly packed and having the different kinds mixed, I could only get from 90s. to 100s. per ton for it—a loss of say from 40 to 50s. per ton through the ignorance and carelessness of the farmers. If that butter had been properly put up, I could just as easily have sold it for 130s. as it was difficult to sell at 95s. The English butter market might be made a very profitable one to us. The demand is almost unlimited. No country in the world can turn out better butter than our farmers, if they only will. But they do not seem to understand that the better butter they make, the more they will get for it. A poor article is dear at any price. If I can sell butter in Liverpool or London at 130s. per ton, I can afford to pay our farmers a good deal more for it than if it only brings 95s. per ton.

WE MUST HAVE COMPULSORY INSPECTION.

But I don't think our farmers will ever learn to put up good butter until we have compulsory inspection. Its no use preaching to them through the newspapers or any other way. I believe the only remedy is compulsion. Let all butter be inspected, graded and stamped, with the name of the maker, and any butter not so graded and stamped should be returned to the owner or sold at auction for grease. You would not hear many complaints after that. If you doubt the absolute necessity for a system of inspection, let me instance the fact that almost every season when the price goes beyond 18 or 20 cents per tub in the Upper Provinces buy up all the rancid butter in the country at a nominal figure, put it through some kind of process which cleanses and purifies it, thus giving it a good appearance then ship it down to this city and other parts of the Maritime Provinces, where it is auctioned at good prices as 'Choice Canadian Dairy Butter'!! And our people in eating this trash which is only fit for axle grease, think they have got a bargain! I tell you what it is, there are but few people who are aware of the trickery and fraud practised in this 'Choice Canadian Butter' business. Now I say that if we had an inspection law, this fraud would not be perpetrated and our people would not be swindled.

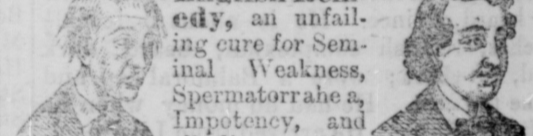
