### HEAVY LOSSES IN ITALIAN ADVANCE

Fascists Drive Toward Harar—Prince Rallies Northern Tribesmen.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MOGADISCIO, Italian Somaliland, April 19.—The left wing of Italy's southern army drove toward Harar today after reporting defeat of 10,000 Ethiopians in four days of bitter fighting near Birout. The Ethiopian forces were engaged by an Italian division under General Nasi, reinforced by native troops.

### RALLIES TRIBESMEN

ADDIS ABABA, April 19.—Crown Prince Asfa Wosani rallied Ethiopian troops south of Dessye today in a desperate effort to stem the Italian advance.

Fresh troops from remote provinces in the interior were ordered northward post haste to reinforce Emperor Haile Selassie's retreating forces. It was disclosed that the removal of the seat of government to less exposed sites was discussed at meeting of chiefs and officials yesterday but no decision was announced.

### ETHIOPIA DOOMED

Economic Sanctions Believed Futile.

By Guardian's Special Wire) GENEVA, April 19.—A prevailing opinion that use of economic sanctions is futile and only force could halt the Italo-Ethiopian war was discernible tonight on the eve of an extraordinary session of the council of the League of Nations. But no country seemed disposed to employ military measures against Italy.

### HITLER HOLDS DESTINY OF EUROPE

Premier Baldwin Defends Foreign Secretary Eden in Address.

### Contact Made Through Five - inch Drill Hole; Supplies Are Lowered

Pair Have But 10 Hours To Live Unless Rescued—Draegermen Volunteer.

(By Edward Williams) MOOSE RIVER, N. S., April 20. — (Monday)—A cry from the depths of Moose River gold mine early today informed rescue workers that H. B. Magill, one of the three men who had been entombed below for a week, was dead.

The voice of Alfred Scadding, carried to the surface by a 100-foot pipeline through which the three had just been fed, told the sad news.

Soup was being fed to them through a rubber tube and all was believed to be well, when suddenly shouts from the pit asked that the tube be hoisted.

Then: "How much longer?" There was no definite answer from the surface, where sleepless men had been laboring against time and walls of rock to free them.

The only answer was a life against a life, and the answer came from Stellarton's crew of draegermen—a crew of rescue men trained to enter a colliery after an explosion.

Out they tumbled at the first call and headed for the dangerous Reynolds shaft from which they had been warned many times by J. P. Messervy, chief inspector of Nova Scotia mines, because of falling rock.

Digging in a shaft where the walls had no support and where death threatened at every foot, the collars went in more than 85 feet and struck cribwork.

They were refused permission to remove it but they worked on anyway, believing it might open a way to the 141-foot level.

It was while the Draegermen were penetrating the old shaft that definite word of Magill's death came to the surface.

As the work proceeded Mrs. Magill, on the scene with Mrs. Robertson for days, had not been told. Meanwhile Dr. Robertson and Scadding were instructed to move to the highest ground they could find while awaiting attempts to break through.

When that would be mine manager F. D. Henderson refused to hazard a guess. Inspector Messervy was just as doubtful.

Work continued on a vertical shaft from the surface that would require three days to complete, but hope was pinned on the collars tunneling amid falling rock.

The report of Magill's death was confirmed by R. J. Ivey of London, Ont., brother-in-law of Dr. Robertson.
