The singer proved to be the watchman of the little town, and his Nacht-lied, or night-song, as it is beautifully called—a sort of hymn, each verse adapted to the hour at which it is sung. There is something delightful in this idea; it is deeply characteristic of the spirit of natural religion which seems to pervade Germany, and the custom is primitive and poetical to the greatest degree.—What can be more touching than to hear the guardian of the silent village, as he walks his nightly rounds, thus drawing a simple moral from the fleeting hours, and invoking for the sleeping inhabitants the protection of that God, who neither slumbers nor sleeps. 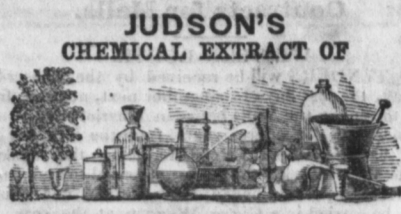
## MICHIGAN.

Among the acts adopted by the late Legislature, was one abolishing all laws for the collection of debt. Michigan has now in force the most of national reform measures. No land limitation law has yet been enacted, although the homestead has long been exempted. A number of mercantile firms and dealers in Kalamazoo, since the abolition of the law relating to debt, have announced their intention of publishing the names of all delinquents, "being well convinced," as they say, "that no man of good intention and honorable principles will allow himself to be thus posted before his neighbors and fellow-citizens." The honour of the man is hereafter to be the foundation of all ordinary transactions. A bold Legislature is that of Michigan.—They have before abolished capital punishment, and now have abolished all obligation to pay debts. But one act more remains to complete their works, and that is, to abolish all laws for the punishment of crime. Then they will have rendered all further legislation needless, and may vote a perpetual dissolution of its own body. And yet we are not prepared to say that good will not come of this experiment. It may be well to see how that principle will work in actual experience. In some respects it will bring an advantage. It will essentially destroy the credit system. It will save the expense of collecting debts—and possibly the risks of loss in the transaction of business will be less than under the prevailing system. It will supersede all bankrupt laws. And bankrupts who cannot be released from the creditors in other States, will be tempted to seek a home in Michigan. But there are some kinds of business, such as banking and others, that cannot be pursued where no legal enforcement claims can be made. And how the courts can adjudicate on any questions that involve property, and enforce their judgment under such a system, we do not see.—*Puritan Recorder.*

ECONOMY OF STEAM POWER.—In Mr. M'Nicoll's timber-yard and saw mill at Liverpool, steam-power has been applied to work the travelling-crane used to convey the timber about the yard. Each crane, when worked by hand, required four men, whereas the steam crane is worked by a man and a boy only, and does double the work, the wages being about three hundred and thirty pounds per annum in one, and sixty-seven in the other. The steam machine will carry thirteen logs of timber, weighing together nineteen and a half tons, one at a time from one end of the yard to the other, a distance of one hundred feet in twenty-six minutes, at a cost of less than sixpence.

SIMILARITY OF BARBAROUS NATIONS.—In their every-day life there is a great similarity in all barbarous nations. Generally the ruler is supreme, and the director of the customs by which, under the sovereign, savage nations are governed. All black nations, in common with many less barbarous, as, for instance, the Chinese and Malays, in speaking of the organ of man's understanding, imagine that we derive reason and wisdom from the belly. In this there is not so much cause for wonder as is generally considered: with a wild man the day's pastime, is regulated by appetite, and by the state of his stomach he is ruled. The educated black looks upon eating and drinking as necessary evils they are compelled to submit to, and, while satisfying the cravings of hunger and thirst, only partake of a sufficiency to sustain nature, and give the necessary strength to enable them to pursue their course of duty. These primitive habits suffer materially on the common advance of civilization and intermixture with Europeans; unless particularly guarded against, the luxury of intoxication completely prostrates the barbarian, and, as with the Indians of North America, might exterminate the aborigines of Africa contemporaneously with the advance of civilization.
