Detroit, Toronto Win Saturday's N.H.L. Games New York, Boston Tied

DETROIT 3, MONTREAL 1
MONTREAL, March 4 — (CP) — The lowly Montreal Canadiens slipped another notch in the National Hockey League race here Saturday night when they lost a 3-1 decision to the league-leading Detroit Red Wings before 14,543 fans.

The defeat moved the fifth-place Montrealers three points back of New York Rangers and Boston Bruins, tied for third place. It was an unpropitious night all around for Canadiens. Coupled with their defeat was the loss of Maurice (Rocket) Richard for the last half of the third period. The sharp-shooter, who went scoreless, was given a game misconduct penalty for fighting in the penalty box with rugged Leo Reisse and then striking linesman Eddie Mephan with his stick. The offense automatically carries a \$50 fine.

BOSTON, March 4 — (AP) — Boston Bruins and New York Rangers continued locked in a three-place National Hockey League tie Saturday night by battling to a 3-3 deadlock, their eighth in 14 games this season, before 9,021 at the Boston Garden. It was the last regular schedule clash of the season for the deadlocked clubs and during their 14-game series, the Bruins collected four triumphs and Rangers two.

TORONTO 3, CHICAGO 0
TORONTO, March 4 — (CP) — Veteran Turk Broda returned to the goaltending job for Toronto Maple Leafs Saturday night after an absence of 20 games and shut out Chicago Black Hawks 3-0 before 12,994 National Hockey League fans. It was his sixth shutout in 28 games this season. The fans let out a roar of applause for the 36-year-old goalie as the game ended and his jubilant teammates rushed to congratulate him before leaving the ice. He has been on the sidelines since Jan. 9 while rookie Al Rollins has been doing the goaltending for Leafs.

Another veteran—Max Bentley—packed the most scoring punch. He scored twice, once in the first period and again in the second. His pair sandwiched a first period score by Cal Gardner. There were only three penalties in the game. But one of them—to Toronto's Gus Mortson—was the toughest in the N. H. L. book. He drew a match penalty for deliberately attempting to injure an opponent. He swung his stick at Adam Brown in the first two minutes of the third period. That put Mortson, who leads the N. H. L. in penalties, out for the game. He can't play again until league president Clarence Campbell deals with his case. Chances are he'll draw a hefty fine and that may be coupled with suspension for a stated number of games.

"Y" And Saints Winners Of League Hoop Games

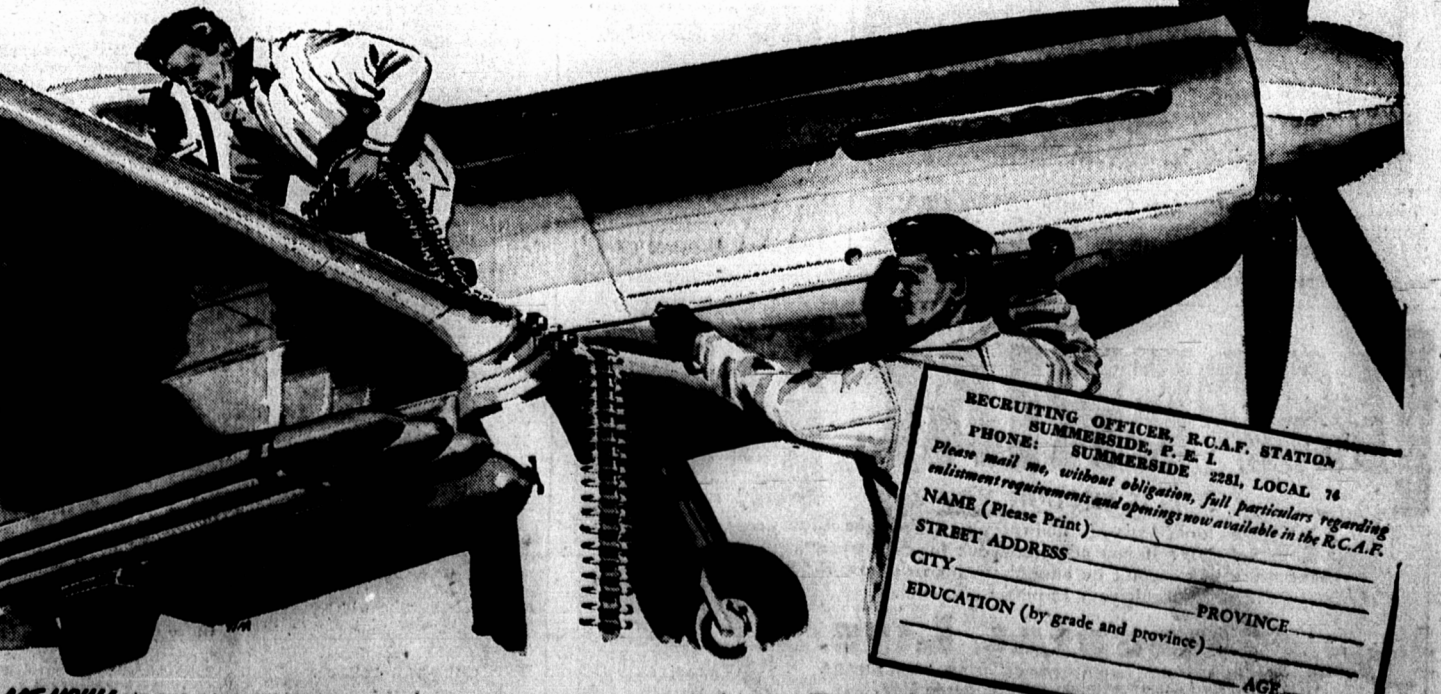

Famous Athlete Is Seriously Ill
TORONTO, March 3 — (CP) — Walter R. Knox, in his day one of Canada's greatest all-round athletes, is seriously ill in hospital at St. Petersburg, Fla. Word which reached here today is that the 73-year-old native of Orillia, Ont., suffered a stroke at the Florida resort. Knox started his championship career in 1900 and during the following 20 years won more than 400 first prizes, 126 seconds and almost 100 thirds. He won the all-round professional track and field championship of North America in 1913. In 1914 he won the world championship at Manchester, England.


