

Local and Other Items.

The Mayor is reported "very low" to-day. REMNANTS of Prints very cheap at J. B. Macdonald's. READ Beer & Goff's advertisement of their September bargains. The Dominion Rifle Association matches commence at Ottawa to-day. All the Provinces are represented. HARVESTING in Manitoba is now over, and the result is on the whole very satisfactory. No frozen wheat this year. MR. LOWMAN YEO, of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Halifax, arrived here in the Princess of Wales on Saturday evening.

The London St. Stephen's Review claims that Lord Londonderry has begun well, for one of his first orders was that fruit from the Vice-regal gardens should be distributed through the Dublin hospitals, and not sold.

A NEW synagogue, costing \$60,000, is shortly to be opened in Montreal by the English-speaking congregation in the latter city. The Portuguese congregation are also preparing plans for a new synagogue to cost \$75,000.

The Secretary of the Department of Customs, Ottawa, has received \$1000 conscience money from an unknown resident of St. Catherine's, Ont. Accompanying the money was a letter intimating that the fraud was committed over 20 years ago.

The St. John Telegraph reports that a deaf man named McNulty was walking along the railway track near the Suspension Bridge a few days ago, when the train came along and pitched him into a soft bank in the neighborhood. He escaped uninjured.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon one of five ducks was fined \$50 or 30 days, and the other four were disposed of for \$4 or 20 days each. One dog was fined \$4. A number of dog and truck tax cases were also adjudicated upon.

The auction sale of the Revere House and adjoining plots of land, which takes place on the 15th September next, offers a rare chance for the "New Hotel Company" or any other number of enterprising men to purchase one of the best sites obtainable for a first-class hotel.

CAPT. PETER McDONALD, of Souris, returned last week from British Columbia where he had been for the last two years. He speaks in glowing terms of that part of the Dominion, but prefers living in little Prince Edward Island after all, and has therefore come home to stay.

The St. John Sun says it was probably through an inadvertence that the Halifax Herald despatch from Moncton, announcing that L. H. Davies, M. P., was to speak at Moncton, appeared with some criminal news under the heading, "A gang of professional burglars coming."

The steamer Clifton, Capt. Wade, which arrived from Sydney, C. B., on Friday last, sailed for London, G. B., at an early hour yesterday morning with a cargo of lobsters, lumber, etc., and Mr. Banforth, Mr. Matthews, the Messrs. Waite, Mrs. John White, and Miss Florence White as passengers.

NEVER SO EXTRAORDINARY.—Mr. Blaine says: The fishery dispute between the United States and Great Britain has passed through many singular phases in the last seventy years, but never before, I think, was it surrounded with such extraordinary circumstances as we find existing at this moment.

MESSRS. R. B. NORTON, David McKay, of the Charlottetown Woollen Co., and D. A. McLeod, of Eldon, left this morning on a business trip to Montreal, Toronto and Niagara Falls. At Moncton they join the excursion party of John McDonald & Co., of Toronto, whose guests they will be while in that city.

On Thursday last a man belonging to Salisbury, N. B., and working on the Buctouche and Moncton Railway, who had been seriously ill for some days because of drinking large quantities of water, vomited up a large lizard, alive and active, which quickly got out of sight in the rubbish. His sickness immediately departed, and he returned home apparently as well as ever. How the lizard got into his stomach is a mystery.

THERE were 120 deaths last week in Montreal, 74 being children under five years of age. For the month of July the deaths numbered 552, in the ratio of 33 per thousand of the population, 80 being of children under five and 280 of infants under one year.

A CONVENTION of Liberal-Conservative electors for the First Electoral District of King's County will be held to-morrow (31st inst.), at 3 p. m., in Agricultural Hall, Souris East, for the purpose of selecting a candidate to run in the interest of the Liberal-Conservative party at the approaching Legislative Council election.

DURING a recent speech at Exeter Hall, London, Gen. Booth, of the Salvation Army, after introducing a tribe of Redskins, who, he said, were going to "scalp" the devil, made the important announcement that a reporter had been "savagely" in Canada, and added that "if they could get more of them saved they would have better notices in the papers." Gen. Booth is to visit P. E. Island next month.

CONSIDERABLE curiosity was felt on Saturday and Sunday last on account of the smoke which spread itself like a dense fog over the land. A schooner ran ashore near Lunenburg, but got off without much difficulty, and some of the fishing boats off the eastern part of the Island found difficulty in making the land owing to the density of the smoke. The smoke evidently came from the Mainland, and there is no doubt but we shall hear of a big fire having taken place somewhere.

PAUL DE ROULDE, the French advocate, whose presence in St. Petersburg is agitating the union of Russia and France in war against their common enemy, Germany, has created such sensation that he has been given another banquet, this time by Russian artists and journalists. The banquet was private. It is learned, however, that the tendency of all the toasts and speeches was to emphasize what the French lawyer described as the "unborn sympathy" of France and Russia, and the "beneficent influence which the French and Russian literature exercise upon each other."
