BOSTON, May 20.—The N. W. England Moral Reform society is after those who dance. Movements of the Fish.

HALIFAX, May 26.—Herring are reported very plentiful to-day at Perce, but continue to be scarce at all the other stations in Quebec as well as on the shores of Northern New Brunswick and P. E. I. The catch was fair at Port Hood, C. B., but scarcely any were taken at any other point on the Cape Breton coast, and the only report of any taken in Nova Scotia was a fair haul at Port La Tour.

The haul of lobsters was very good to-day at Perce, (Que) and at Point Escumec, N. B., so many are being taken that it is reported that some factories will have to stop fishing to clear what is already on hand. The fishery continues good also on the north coast of P. E. I. On the Cape Breton coast the catch was good at Port Hood and fair at Arichat; in Nova Scotia fair at Spry Bay and Port Latour and very good at Pabnico and Digby. Mackerel are abundant at Pabnico and Johns Island, N.S., and a few very fine ones were taken to-day, at Digby. United States seiners in port at Liverpool, report not one school seen yet.

The herring fishery at the Magdalen Islands is reported a failure and many bankers are compelled to leave there without being paid.

Primate of England.

LONDON, May 19.—It is stated that the vacant archbishopric of York has been offered to Rt. Rev. William Dalrymple MacLagan bishop of Lichfield. The bishop of Lichfield is a Scotsman. He was born at Edinburgh in 1826. He is a son of the late Dr. David MacLagan, a distinguished medical officer, who served under Wellington in the peninsular war. The bishop himself was intended for a military career. At an early age he joined the army in India, and it was not till his 26th year that he resigned his commission of lieutenant and retired from the service.

Four years later, in 1856, he graduated at St. Peter's College, Cambridge, and was at once ordained a deacon. In the following year, he was admitted to the priesthood. In 1855, on the death of the Rev. Dr. Dalrymple, he was appointed curate of Enfield. In 1859 he obtained the rectorate of Newington, Surrey; in 1875 he was appointed vicar of Kensington, and in 1878 he was consecrated bishop of Lichfield, the promotion coming to him from Lord Beaconsfield's hand. The see of Lichfield, which includes Derbyshire, Staffordshire, and parts of Shropshire, brings to its holder the very comfortable stipend of \$21,000 per annum. But the archbishopric of York carries with it the primacy of England and a stipend of \$50,000 per annum.

LONDON, May 27.—The Government have made private proposals to Newfoundland which will obviate the passing of Lord Knutsford's bill. The delegates are now considering the proposals.

TORONTO, May 27.—A London special to the Globe says Goldwin Smith's forcible letter in the Times to-day on Sir Charles Tupper's article in Contemporary Review dealing with the charge that the Conservatives at the last election had to face a formidable conspiracy to subvert British institutions in Canada and annex the Dominion to the United States.

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

THE attention of Citizens is directed to Section 163 of "The City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act," which reads as follows:—

No cesspool, ash-pit, manure-pit, or other place for the reception of slop, or washings or drainings, shall be used in the said City of a greater depth than two feet below the surface of the ground, and all such cesspools, ash-pits, manure-pits, or other receptacles as aforesaid, as are of a greater depth, shall immediately be thoroughly cleaned and filled up with ashes or clean clay.

Any person aware of the existence of such places will confer a favor upon the undersigned by reporting the same at once, as he is determined that the law shall be rigidly enforced.
