MONDAY

The members of the Prince Edward Island Jersey Breeders Club were willing to bid more than \$6,000 for Brantford B. Violet's Beacon, the three-year-old sire who sold at the Roslyn Park Farm, Galt, Ontario, Friday, it was learned from Mr. George MacMillan last night.

The young bull sold for \$6,500 after Mr. Edison Match of North River had gone to the six grand mark. Mr. Mutch, who showed at the Royal represented the Club at the sale.

The nearest dams of the sire have outstanding butter fat records and his maternal great-granddam, Brantford Basilia, is the world's champion jersey butter fat producer with an R. O. P. record of 1313 pounds in 365 days as a five-year-old.

Mr. Mutch viewed the progeny of the sire at the sale and was to use his own judgement on the price that should be paid for the bull.

The re-establishment, at Halifax, of Royal and Provisional schools this winter for training Reserve Army personnel, N.C.O.'s and officers, was among the proposed plans of headquarters Eastern Command, Lt.-Col. Regiment (17th Recce) to train, as a unit, at Sussex and Tracadie, N.B., along with the Halifax Rifles, while the 5th Signals Regiment attended camp at Ainslie, N.S. The 28th I.A.A. would again go to Ontario points.

Premier J. Walter Jones, and Messrs. E. D. Reid, manager of the Provincial Potato Marketing Board and D. A. MacDonald, Glenfinnan, chairman of the same board, left by plane yesterday for Ottawa where they will seek support for this year's potato crop.

They were slated to meet Premier J. B. MacNair of New Brunswick and his advisors at Moncton. The two-province delegation will meet the Federal authorities today.

**RIMOUSKI, Que., Nov. 21**—(CP)—James Cardinal McGuigan of Toronto today conducted a solemn funeral service for Most Rev. Georges Courchesne while the town of Rimouski observed a day of civic mourning for the Roman Catholic Archbishop who died last week.

Three funeral masses were celebrated in St. Germain Cathedral during the morning and later the Archbishop's body was taken to Rimouski country for burial.

Cardinal McGuigan, returned by air from the Vatican three days ago, conducted the main service in the presence of representatives of governments and Roman Catholic churches in all parts of Canada.

An early mass over the body of Archbishop Courchesne was celebrated for school children and a later service was held for members of parishes in the Archdiocese of Rimouski.

**GRENOBLE, France, Nov. 21**—(Reuters)—A special funeral service was held here today for Mrs. Helen Johnson MacDonald of Montreal, 29-year-old stewardess of the Canadian Pilgrim plane which crashed Nov. 12 in the French Alps, killing 58.

Her funeral came three days after a mass service for 50 of the victims. Her body was found Sunday.

**PAINFULLY BURNED**—Nineteen-month-old Jane Peters and her mother, Mrs. Edmund Peters, 23 Hensley Street, were admitted to the Charlottetown Hospital on Sunday night for burns. The accident occurred when a cloth Mrs. Peters was using to clean off the stove became ignited and set fire to the child's clothes. After treatment Mrs. Peters was released but the child was suffering from third degree burns on her legs and it will be some time before she can be released. Her condition yesterday was described as very good.

This would apply in all cases except those of long shaped varieties where the minimum diameter may be no less than three and one half inches.

The child saw her father coming toward her on the other side of the road and after waiting for a car which was coming from the city to pass her, ran across in the path of the truck driven by Jerome O'Brien.

He jammed on his brakes and getting out of his truck found the child lying on the road with her clothing under his front right wheel. He picked her up and rushed her to the hospital where her condition is being observed in case of complications.

Funeral services for the late Mr. William A. MacDonald, 65 years of age, and native of Kinross, P. E. I., were held Monday afternoon in Calgary, Alberta. Mr. MacDonald died suddenly on Nov. 17th, and is survived by his wife, the former Jean Williams, who was born in Calgary. He went west over 40 years ago in the month following that of his sister, Mrs. Euphemia Jane Rowe, in Coughlin, B.C. She is survived by her husband E. Percy Rowe, many years a resident of Ugg, P. E. I., and four daughters and three sons, all residing in Vancouver.

Four sisters are living: Mrs. Simon D. Campbell, Ugg; Mrs. Duncan MacDonald, Lyndale; Mrs. Alexander MacDonald, Ugg; and Mrs. J. Ernest Kerr, Brookline, Mass.

A verdict that "deceased had come to his death by the collapse of a concrete ceiling in the building in which he was working" was brought in by the coroner's jury at the inquest into the death of John Jasper Weatherbie, 190 Kent Street, held yesterday afternoon at the City Police Court.

Coroner Dr. J. D. MacGulgan called seven witnesses, each of whom was questioned by Crown counsel, J. J. Nicholson. Reviewing the case, the Coroner told how the deceased had been taken from under the debris of a collapsed concrete ceiling in a building on lower Prince Street, on the morning of Wednesday, Nov. 22, and that he had been dead when admitted to hospital.
