(gr.) from 7 to 10 cents per lb.; mutton, from 7 to 12 cents per lb.; lamb (per qr.) from 50 cents to \$1.00; butter (fresh) from 16 to 20 cents per lb.; do (tub) 16 cents; eggs, from 8 to 10 cents per doz.; hay, from 50 to 60 cents per 100 lbs.; oats, from 38 to 40 cents per bushel.

DEPARTURE OF ARCHDEACON READ.—At a Committee Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society held last evening, the following gentlemen were appointed to prepare the draft address to be presented to the Ven. Archdeacon Read previous to his departure from the Province, viz:—Rev. Alfred Osborne, H. J. Cundall, and T. B. Reagh. The Archdeacon will, we learn, probably leave the Island about Saturday next.

The case of Charles J. Clarke vs. William Hurry and John Holman was tried before Theoph. DesBrisay, Esq., to-day. The action was by Mr. Clarke against the defendants for a breach of the act for the regulation of railways. Hurry who is the servant of Mr. Holman—ignorant of the law—allowed his horses to run at large on the railway track without his master's knowledge. They were both fined 25 cents and costs. There were two other cases settled out of court, one of which was for a malicious assault on a dog.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, John Stanlake appeared on complaint of Francis Monaghan, for trespass. The nature of the trespass was, that Mr. Stanlake's hens made frequent raids on Mr. Monaghan's garden, and he wished to make Mr. Stanlake to "keep his hens within himself in future." The defendant was fined five cents and costs, and ordered, on next complaint of Mr. Monaghan, to pay a penalty of two dollars. The assault case of P. C. Connolly vs. J. H. Crowley, was dismissed with costs.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 17.
The baggage belonging to the Russian headquarters was removed from San Stefano to-day.
It is not known whether General Todelben is moving northward or towards the centre of the Russian line; but the latter direction is thought more probable.

VIENNA, June 17.
In the Lower House of the Reichsrath to-day, the Bill relative to the new compromise law, passed a third reading. The Austria-Hungarian compromise, is thus finally sanctioned, as far as the Chamber of Deputies is concerned.

LONDON, June 17.
The Lord President of the Privy Council, the Duke of Richmond and Gordon, replying to Earl Granville in the House of Lords to-day, said the memorandum of agreement between England and Russia, published in the "Globe," was surreptitiously procured through some person having access to a confidential paper. As an explanation of the Government's policy he said it was incomplete, and therefore inaccurate. The Government would, at the earliest moment, give the fullest information.

OTTAWA, June 17.
It is likely A. D. Hughes, of Toronto, will be invited by the Reformers of Niagara to contest the seat against Mr. Plumb.
Alderman Rashon, of Hull, announces himself as a candidate for the Commons, in Opposition to Alonzo Wright in the County of Ottawa.

The Medical Council of Ontario, at its annual meeting at Toronto, has been informed by its President that he had papers from the Medical Council of England, which led him to believe that it was willing to acknowledge Canadian degrees of good standing, providing Canada reciprocates.

A cablegram says it is announced that the Prince of Wales has consented to accept the Presidency of the Royal Colonial Institute. He will be formally elected at the annual meeting on the 20th inst.
