PERSONS using the Telephone would find talking much more satisfactory if they would observe the following Rules: 1st. Speak with your mouth about four inches from the transmitter. 2nd. It is possible to talk and be heard when standing back two or three feet from the transmitter, if you shout loud enough, but it is not a pleasant mode of conversation, is entirely unnecessary, and is a useless waste of wind and lungs, besides being very annoying to all within range of your voice.
