

# Pearson To Mix With The People

Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson will be in Charlottetown on Saturday evening on his only swing through the island during the 1965 election campaign.

Mr. Pearson will be accompanied by his wife and they will arrive at the Charlottetown airport at 5.30 Saturday evening. On hand to meet them will be Mr. and Mrs. W.R. Jenkins, Dr. and Mrs. M. Bonnell, the four Island Liberal candidates and their wives, Mayor and Mrs. Walter Cox, Mr. and Mrs. John P. Nicholson and Mrs. Aiden Mulligan.

The Lovat Scots Pipe Band will be at the airport and the Prime Minister and his party will be taken into Charlottetown by a motorcade composed of members of the Junior Liberals from all over the Island.

The motorcade will travel from Brackley Point Road to the St. Peter's Road to Euston St. to Great George St. to Grafton to Queen and from Queen Street the motorcade will go to the Charlottetown Hotel.

The prime minister will rest and have dinner at the hotel and then attend a reception Saturday evening at the Confederation Centre. He will make a short speech and mingle with the people.

# Magistrate Imposes \$50 Fine In Suspended License Case

ALBERTON — A total of 19 cases were disposed of by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald at Alberton yesterday afternoon.

# Rink Facelifting May Be Project

BORDEN — The monthly meeting of Borden Town Council was held last evening. Present were: Mayor Gilbert Bell and councillors Bernard Flemming, Arthur E. Jay, Reginald McAleer, Everett MacKenna and William MacIver.

Bills amounting to \$663.27 were passed and approved. Taxes amounting to \$5,000 are outstanding and action is to be taken immediately.

A discussion of a possible project for centennial year took place, and it was agreed to get more information from the centennial committee. One project considered was that the rink might be given a face lifting.

Sewage facilities are proceeding satisfactorily and a number of residents are installing the facilities. It was recommended that a supervisor be appointed to inspect any hook-up and any residents not installing and complying with same will be notified that their homes are uninhabitable.

The Pearson Government have been fulfilled.

A harbor will be built at Sea Cow Pond, he said, and work is expected to start within the next week. Tenders have been reviewed and the contract awarded.

# Board Of Trade Wants Prince National Park

ALBERTON — Gordon Ripley, resources development field man for ARDA was guest speaker last night at the regular meeting of Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade.

A number of projects under the ARDWA program were described by Mr. Ripley such as the West Prince Blueberry Co-op, which may eventually be an \$18,000 development; similar projects in Goose River, Souris and Foxley River; a community pasture area in Lot 16, a \$150,000 program and one in O'Leary which will eventually cover 1,000 in the coming year.

A number of dams have been constructed under ARDA for soil and water conservation and these are also being used for trout fishing, Mr. Ripley said. Dams planned for development next year are located in Tyne Valley, Foxley River and Montrose.

A fish ladder at the new \$20,000 dam at Arsenault's Pond in Tignish was discussed and efforts are to be made to have this carried out. A large delegation was in attendance from Tignish to support efforts to have the road over the dam gravelled, the fish ladder built, and some repairs made to the dam.

Noting that efforts are being made to have the proposed second national park located in another county, the president of the board, Fred Peters, said he couldn't understand why any other area than West Prince was being considered at this time. "We have been making representations regarding this park for West Prince for some time," Mr. Peters told the meeting, "and were given assurance by the premier, at a meeting in Alberton last fall that a very definite recommendation had been made to the federal authorities and the sug-

gested location was in West Prince." The secretary C. R. Leard was appointed chairman of a committee to draw up a further resolution regarding the park with power to add members to the committee.

**SCALLOP SURVEY**  
Assurances have been given regarding a survey for scallop beds next spring to include the area from North Cape to New London Head.

The problem of CNR express service was discussed and the matter is to be taken up with the Maritime Transportation Commission and the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade.

Harold Phillips, Sonway, Gerald Haudrahan, Tignish and Andrew Wells, Alberton, were appointed a committee to find out how many would be interested in a bookkeeping course for small business and farmers.

Harvey Hunt, Leo D. Arsenault and Carmen McNeill were appointed to bring in a slate of officers at the annual banquet meeting in O'Leary on Nov. 3.

A request from the Summer- side Board of Trade asking support for the construction of a new tourist bureau at Reid's Corner, was approved.

room of members and special guests.

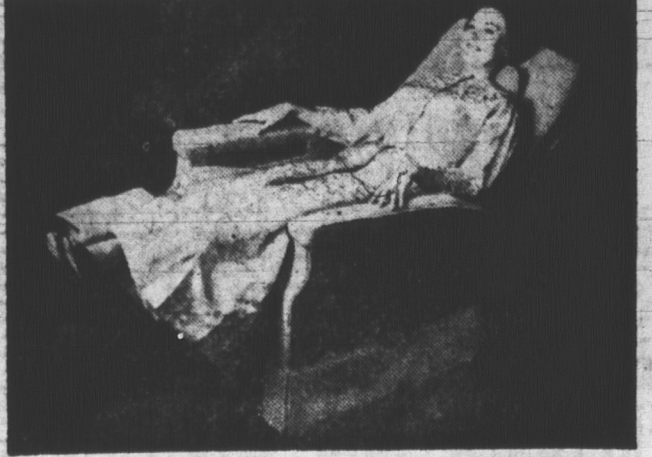

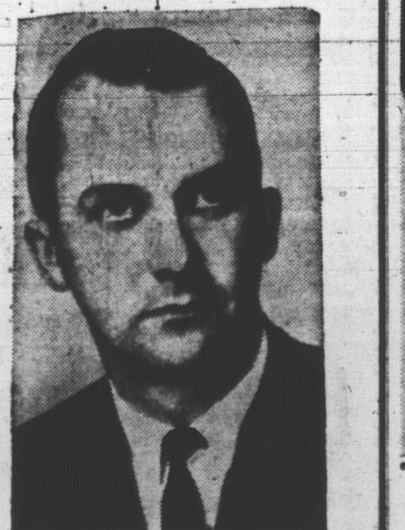
