

The Wreck of the Narragansett.

HEROISM OF A PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND LADY.

Mrs. William Howard, who, with her husband boarded with Mr. Daniel Doran in the old mansion at the foot of 125th street Harlem River, was also a passenger on the Narragansett. Mrs. Howard is a graceful, modest lady, about 22 years of age, and not by any means appearing as if she could successfully face such a terrible exigency. When the collision occurred she was asleep in her stateroom. Startled at the crash and the confusion which followed, she rushed into the saloon, where one of the hands assured her there was no danger. She groped her way back to her stateroom, the lights having gone out, and dressed herself, even placing her pocket-book in the bosom of her dress. When she reached the deck she buttoned her shoes with a hairpin, and then secured a life preserver, not as a supposed necessity, but merely as a precaution. She did not know how to use the life-preserver, and several men refused to assist her, so intent were they on their own preservation.

She soon became aware of the danger. The cry of fire was raised, and she could see the reflection on the water, while the boat was plainly sinking. Then she hesitated no longer. She held the life preserver firmly under her arms and jumped into the water. She had no fear of the water, as she had learned to swim at the 125th street beach during the two weeks previous. She struck out boldly toward a life raft, and was taken on board, where she remained nearly three hours, being at times breast deep in the water, the raft being so heavily loaded. While on the raft a man swam up with his little son on his back. He begged them to take the boy, but they refused, whereupon Mrs. Howard at the risk of her own life leaned over, grasped the child in her arms and drew him on the raft. The father clung to the raft for some time and then disappeared. Mrs. Howard fears that he was drowned.

Some time after a woman floated along and was allowed to grasp the side of the raft. She was soon exhausted, and cried that she must lose her hold and be lost. Mrs. Howard although benumbed with cold and exhausted by previous efforts could not see this woman perish. She clung as best she could with one arm to the raft, while with the other she clasped the exhausted woman around the waist and upheld her, and thus she remained until help came. She is badly bruised about the body and limbs, and suffers much from the strain occasioned by sustaining the woman for so long a time. She is now at home, and under the watchful care of her husband and her physician, will soon be restored to health and strength. She is a true heroine and in listening to her modest recital of the danger she has passed through, it seems incredible that Providence had placed so brave a heart in a woman, while denying it to the strong men who weakened in the hour of peril.—*Harlem Record June 16.*

She had only been married but a very short time, and was going on a visit to her sister in Boston when the collision took place. 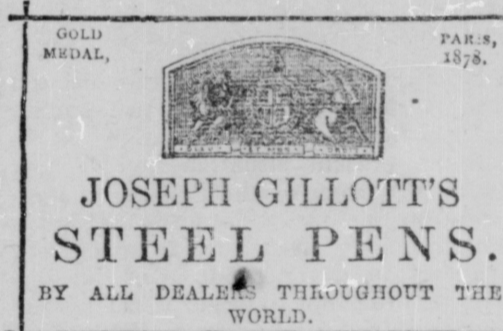
