MR. CYRUS SHAW, M. L. A.

We had to announce, but briefly, yesterday, in but part of the last edition of THE EXAMINER, the deeply lamented death of Mr. Cyrus Shaw. The news will, we feel sure, bring genuine sadness to many homes; for by Catholics and Protestants, by Conservatives and Liberals, by the great majority of those who enjoyed his acquaintance and friendship, Mr. Shaw was esteemed and beloved.

His recovery from the illness of last year was not followed by robust health. But his spirit was strong. At the last session of the Legislature he was able to take a leading part in the debates and proceedings, and his friends were encouraged to hope that he would yet be able to give many years of useful service to the Province. But this hope was not to be realized. A short time ago, appendicitis supervened. He was subsequently removed to the P. E. Island Hospital where an operation was performed. But too late. He bore up bravely, however, and held on to life so long that it was hoped he might survive. An unfavorable report was given by his physicians yesterday morning. The poison in his blood at length prevailed; and last evening his spirit passed away.

Mr. Shaw was in his fifty-first year. He was born at New Perth in January, 1850, the son of the late Robert Shaw, Esquire. His early years were spent upon his father's farm and at the neighboring school. Afterwards he attended Prince of Wales College. Then he returned to the farm, and entered upon his life's work. He was an advanced and successful farmer. He took a leading part in the establishment of the dairy industry, vigorously seconding the efforts of Professor Robertson and Mr. Dillon in this regard, not only at New Perth but in many of the settlements in which factories were subsequently established. Of his ability as a representative of the farming community in the Provincial Legislature we need not speak. He had such an intimate knowledge of the public business and affairs, as well as of all the conditions of the Province, that it will be difficult, perhaps impossible to fill his place in the Legislative Assembly. His ability as a platform and parliamentary speaker, his quickness and sharpness of repartee, his biting sarcasm, his earnestness on behalf of the interests of the country, his native wit and genuine eloquence, cannot indeed be again supplied.

He was a warm-hearted, as well as a highly intelligent and well-informed man. His friends will be able to appreciate the heavy loss, in love and care, that his wife and daughter, his nephew and other relatives have sustained, and to sympathize with them.

His remains were conveyed to New Perth by train this forenoon, and we learn that the funeral will take place at two o'clock tomorrow.

AN EXHIBITION—SURELY!

We doubt if there was one person identified with the interests and good name of Prince Edward Island, who saw the cattle from the Government Stock Farm on the show ground, on Wednesday, the 26th instant, but felt emotions of shame, disgust and contempt for the motley group. The Ayrshires displayed no udders, the Shorthorns lacked every characteristic necessary to the animal expected to give a profit, either for milk or beef; and their calves were, compared with those of good breeders, "half starved-looking creatures." Farmers who have been generous buyers at the Government cattle sales the last few years were, on the previous day, greatly disappointed at the absence of the Government cattle from the Ayrshire and Short-horn prize competitions. As it was a Maritime Provincial Exhibition they very properly concluded that the cattle from the Government Stock Farm would take a leading part in promoting our provincial fame as a stock-breeding centre, as was done by the Sullivan-Ferguson government years ago at Halifax, St. John and Montreal. But when these farmers saw the scare-crows and dry bones that filed into the auction yard the following day, their disappointment changed to disgust, and their respect for our private breeders of registered Ayrshire and Shorthorn cattle, who in the face of the competition of the Government Farm were ready and able to meet on equal terms the splendid exhibits from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, was increased. If our local breeders of those breeds did not come off best every time we may blame the Government. In every other class of fine-bred cattle, sheep and horses, our Island breeders came out in the prize ring with flying colors. This is the reward our province gets for its outlay on that expensive farm.

If we add to the first cost of land and live stock the accumulated interest, and rent, neither of which have been paid, together with the debt on working expenses which accumulates year after year, it will be found that the Government Farm owes the province over fifty thousand dollars. And when the stock is allowed to run down, as it evidently is under the present administration, there is nothing but disgrace to show for the money.
