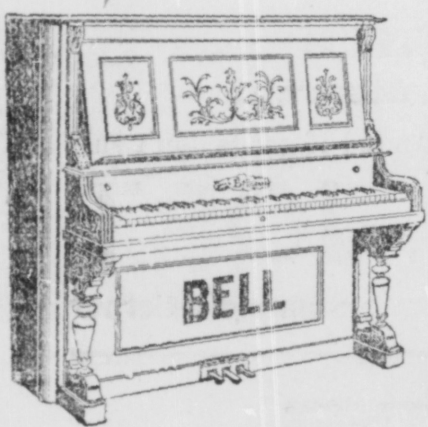

### An Anecdote by Mark Twain.

Mark Twain writes for the Century a tribute to his fellow townsman, the late James Hammond Trumbull. Mr. Clemens relates the following anecdote:

Years ago, as I have been told, a widowed descendant of the Audubon family in desperate need sold a perfect copy of Audubon's "Birds" to a commercially minded scholar in America for \$100. The book was worth \$1,000 in the market. The scholar complimented himself upon his shrewd stroke of business. That was not Hammond Trumbull's style. After the war a lady in the far south wrote him that among the wreckage of her better days she had a book which some had told her was worth \$100 and had advised her to offer it to him. She added that she was very poor, and that if he would buy it at that price it would be a great favor to her. It was Elliot's Indian Bible. Trumbull answered that if it was a perfect copy it had an established market value, like a gold coin, and was worth \$1,000; that if she would send it to him he would examine it, and if it proved to be perfect he would sell it to the British museum and forward the money to her. It did prove to be perfect, and she got her \$1,000 without delay and intact.

### An Author's First Strike.

It is told of Justin McCarthy that in his early days he once submitted a story to a magazine called The Galaxy. One day he said to the editor, "I have come to see if you will take that story I offered The Galaxy."  
"Yes," cordially responded the editor, "and 60 more like it."  
"Time passed, and one day Mr. McCarthy walked into The Galaxy office with an imposing pile of manuscript under his arm. "What is that?" asked Mr. Sheldon.  
Mr. McCarthy laid the bundle of manuscript upon the publisher's desk and replied, "Here are the 60 stories you ordered on the occasion of my last visit."  
He got a check covering the whole 60.—London Telegraph.

### SOME UNUSUAL TITLES.

The Names of a Few Books Which Have Not Been Copyrighted.

Mr. Young gracefully referred him to a clerk in that department, and as the clerk was getting the paper ready he was making himself interesting by talking.

"Yes, sir," he was saying, "I rather think you have hit upon a good title for your book. Of course some people won't know what the dickens—I beg your pardon—what on earth it means, but that doesn't make any difference to you. They are stupid people who wouldn't buy it anyhow. Still there's a good deal in a title. Of course I don't mean the kind our rich girls love to marry," and the clerk chuckled, "but titles of books. You understand. I just made a list I came across today. They are from different sources. "Then there were some old volumes of the time of Cromwell which had titles like these: 'Crumbs of Comfort For the Children of the Covenant,' 'High Heeled Shoes For Dwarfs In Holiness,' 'Hooks and Eyes For Believers' Breaches,' 'The Spiritual Mustard Pot to Make the Soul Sneeze With Devotion,' 'Tobacco Battered and the Pipes Shattered About Their Ears That Idly Idolize So Loathsome a Vanity, by a Volley of Holy Shot Thundered From Mount Helicon, a Poem Against the Use of Tobacco,' by Joshua Sylvester; 'The Snuffers of Divine Love,' 'Seven Sobs of a Sorrowful Soul For Sin,' and some more of the same sort. Added to these are a few scattering ones like these: 'Waves of Sound and the High C,' 'A Jawey Forever,' by an Active Prizefighter; 'A Rich American, or the Earl's Choice,' and so on through a list of odd ones."

The clerk handed the journalist a folded paper.

"Thank you," said the journalist. "Fifty cents, please. Anything more today?" smiled the clerk, and the incident was closed.—Washington Star.

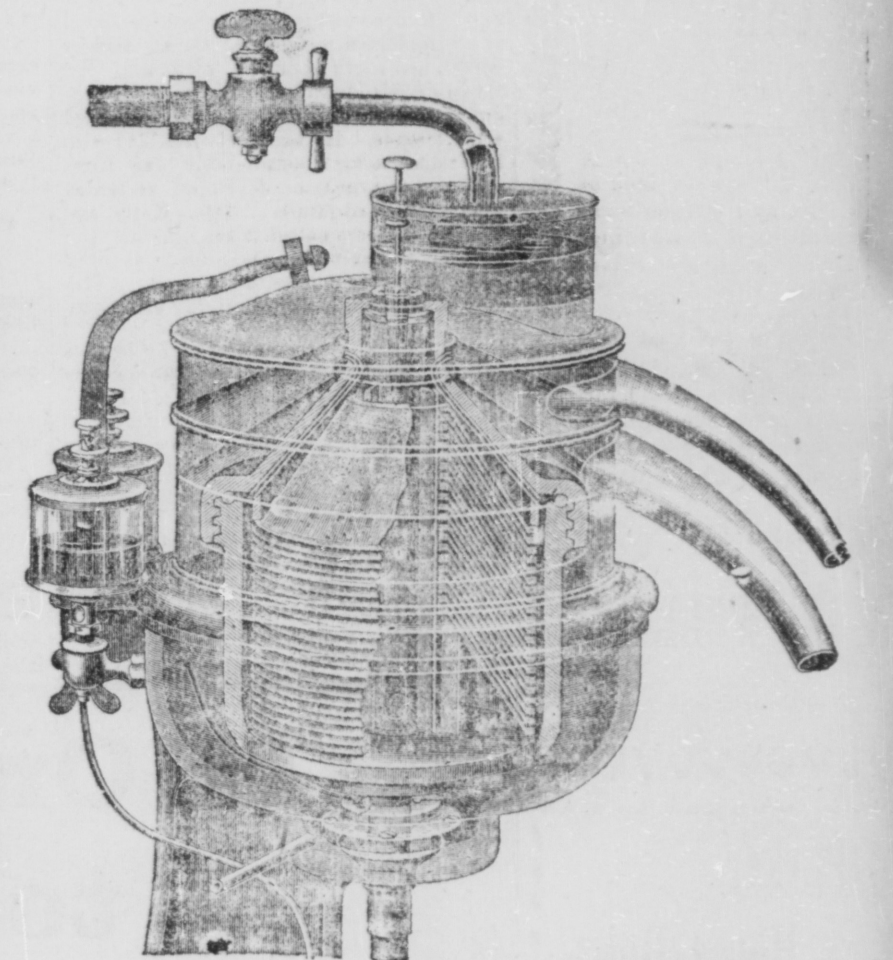
