

Use Of Rainwater Banned For Food

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) — The use of rainwater for drinking and food preparation purposes has been banned on the island of Saltholm after studies showed "a heavy increase of radioactivity" in the water.

The island, measuring some eight square miles, is situated east of Copenhagen. There are only a dozen permanent residents but in the summer thousands of tourists go there.

At present, there is no other drinking water than rainwater. The Taastrup municipality, which issued the ban, is planning to transport drinking water to Saltholm by boat, at least temporarily.

Dr. Hilde Levi of Copenhagen University, who conducted the Saltholm study, said it indicated the rainwater contained generally about twice as much radioactive fallout as the quantity "internationally agreed as the safety limit."

She said the same might be generally true about rainwater throughout Denmark, "but this is hardly any problem, since most Danes don't drink rainwater, at least not daily, and we just want people to stop drinking it for longer periods."
