LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

The Recent Decision—A Protest.

SIR,—I noticed in the editorial remarks
in your issue of yesterday, on the recent
appeals to the Supreme Court at Ottawa,
a sentence which reflects rather upon our
Supreme Court Judges here, and in which
you say that "for their own credit they
should give more study and consideration
to the cases which come before them." It
is to be regretted that you should, through
the columns of your paper, attempt to
weaken the respect which is due to our
Supreme Court, and were you better in-
formed of the particulars of the two cases
you criticize, you would have hesitated be-
fore doing so.
Both these cases turned upon the inter-
pretation of Statutes, one of the most difficult
questions with which lawyers and Judges
have to deal; and one upon which the
minds of Judges are rarely in accord. The
rules of construction are, true, well establish-
ed, but the difficulty arises when they are
applied to Statutes which too often are in-
accurately and carelessly framed. Had
you occasion to read the decisions of the
ablest Judges in England and America you
would find that these Judges, while con-
stantly differing among themselves, and
from the Judges of the Court appealed from,
invariably admit the difficulty in determin-
ing the true construction of Statutes, and
give their opinion with great hesitancy, and
with every respect for the opinion of those
differing from them.

With reference to the two cases you cite,
I unhesitatingly say that never was a charge
more unjust or unfounded than the one you
make. In the matter of the appeal of the
Shareholders of the Bank of P. E. I., the
counsel engaged in the cause can inform
you, that the judge who decided that case,
not only listened with great attention to
the lengthened arguments made before him,
but of his own accord suggested a postponement
that certain facts which he deemed
material might be elicited. The two
lengthened judgments which he afterwards
delivered show a research and a study
which only a conscientious able man could
give; every important decision bearing upon
the question was quoted, and carefully analyzed.
The full text of the decision of the
Supreme Court at Ottawa is not yet in
print, but I am satisfied when it does ap-
pear, that though it will reverse Judge
Peters decision it will recognize the ability
of his judgment and the great
difficulty there was in arriving at
a correct determination of the in-
tent of the Statute under review.

In the business of the Liquidation of
this Bank, no Judge could have possibly
shown greater industry, or taken a more
active interest in its successful termination.
Prompt judgments have been given in
every case; and the present highly satisfac-
tory state of the Liquidation proceedings
is largely due to his untiring energy and
ability.
In the other case, our Judges wisely de-
clined to reverse the well-known and well-
established rule as to the service of notices
of dishonor where both parties reside in
the same place, until the highest court in
the land had authoritatively decided what
interpretation should be given to the more
than ambiguous language of the Dominion
Statute regulating such services. This
course was unquestionably the wisest one
in the interests of our whole commercial
community. Had you listened to
the argument, and heard it openly
stated in Court, by lawyers of undoubted
standing, that in many of the largest cities
of the Dominion, the practice there, was the
same as our own, you would have hesitated
before using this decision as a text to decry
the judicial capacity of our Bench.

In conclusion, Sir, as a member of the
Bar of this Province, I protest against the
use of such language as you have seen fit
to use in this instance. It is not in ac-
cordance with the truth. It is condemned by
all right-thinking men; and it is an un-
merited slur upon men whose conscientious,
pains-taking discharge of their duties,
is universally recognized and appreciated
throughout the length and breadth of this
Province.

price far in advance of its value. Now, one
of these stories must be untrue. It is
impossible for the syndicate to be under
the thumb of the Government and for the
Government at the same time to be under
the thumb of the syndicate. An explana-
tion is respectfully solicited.—Toronto
Mail.

It was authoritatively announced the 19th
inst. that Groff, Bennett & Co., iron
manufacturers, Pittsburg, Pa., have called
their creditors to meet to-morrow, and will
ask for an extension of time. They will
offer one-third their liabilities in instal-
ments, in three, six and nine months, and
the balance in three years, with ample
security. It is considered that an extension
will be granted. The liabilities are \$1,
560,000; assets \$2,000,050, exclusive of
real estate, which is worth over a million,
and believed to be unencumbered.

CURRENT NOTES.

Mr. Parnell will cross the Atlantic this fall.

A coal monopoly is threatened in Mon-
treal.

This year's western oat crop is estimated
at \$100,000,000.

It is stated that France will accept British
mediation in Madagascar.

Yellow Jack claimed forty victims in
Havana during last week.

A contract to rebuild the Montreal drill-
shed has been let for \$45,000.

Hon. James Young has been elected for
North Brant by a majority of 549.

The Greenville canal improvements on the
Ottawa have all been completed.

Four persons were burned to death in a
tenement house in Inverness, Scotland,
Friday last.

Fighting has occurred daily in Albania
since the 12th inst. Other tribes are ex-
pected to join the rebels.

It is stated that the staff of the British
North Borneo Company have been attacked
and killed by the natives.

In Montreal recently the libel suit of the
Star against the Huntingdon Gleasher fell
through on a technicality.

The Prussian Government's Church bill
has passed its second reading before a com-
mittee of the Lower House.

It is stated that a new English Steamship
Co. has been organized to take up the trade
between Brazil and Canada.

Star-router Dorsey now talks of bringing
libel suits against the newspapers which
made things unpleasant for him.

Five men have been committed for trial,
at Tralee, Ireland, on a charge of murder-
ing a man named Walsh in May.

General Crook and his staff have arrived
at Wilcox, Arizona, on their return from
their Indian campaign in Mexico.

John Bright has come to the conclusion
that the Irish obstructionists in the House
of Commons are not behaving themselves.

London newspapers unanimously approve
of the sentence passed by the dynamiters,
as does the Freeman's Journal, the Irish
organ.

The lady voters at Gananadoc exercised
their franchise on the recent occasion of a
municipal by-law being submitted to the
electors.

Mr. Montague Curzon (Conservative) has
been elected without opposition to the Im-
perial House of Commons for North Leices-
tershire.

Large quantities of war material are
being purchased in the United States on
Chinese account, and shipped via San
Francisco.

The Steamer "Celtic" which arrived at
New York on Friday last, with eight hun-
dred steerage passengers, had three cases of
smallpox on board.

Mr. James Gordon Bennett has contrib-
uted \$2,500 towards the expenses of the
United States National Rifle Association
team that is to go to Wimbledon.

At the trial at Cobourg, on Saturday, of
Aitkin, charged with feloniously slaying
Frank Little at Centreville, the jury
brought in a verdict of guilty of assault.

A survey is to be made at once of the
river Thames between London and the head
of navigation in order to settle the question
of the possibility of utilizing the stream as a
waterway.

The steamer Sophia, with Prof. Nor-
kenskold and Arctic exploring expedition,
arrived at Reykjavik, Iceland, June 6th.
The party intended to start for Greenland
on the 10th.

Four Poles, charged with giving informa-
tion to the revolutionists of the movements
of Russian troops, have been arrested in
Germany for extradition at the request of
the Russian Government.

The sinking of the propeller "Canada" adds
another to the already long list of
disasters to Canadian shipping this season.
Captain Donnelly, the Canadian wrecker,
has gone to her assistance.

The British National Rifle Association
has decided not to allow the American
competitors at Wimbledon to use the
screw wind gauge in the competitions at
Wimbledon except in the international
match.

Mr. Gladstone is said to be showing un-
mistakable symptoms of breaking down,
and it is asserted that should the radical
measures proposed by the advanced section
of the Cabinet be carried, he will retire
from public life.

A correspondent, writing to a free trade
paper, announces that in Canada to-day
"cottons are being sold at less than the cost
of manufacturing." This is how the
naughty, naughty cotton manufacturers are
robbing the public and making dividends of
from ninety to nine hundred per cent.

While a public sale was in progress at the
residence of R. S. Light, at Princetown,
near Ravensden, on Saturday, a heavy thun-
der storm came up, and the men took re-
fuge in a large barn. The building was
struck by lightning and three men were
killed and two or three others injured.

The Milton Hydraulic Mining Co's reser-
voir at Smarville, California, containing
650,000,000 cubic feet of water, burst on
the afternoon of the 19th inst. The rush
of water was irresistible and swept away
everything from its path. It raised the
middle of the Zaba river one hundred feet.
The roar of rushing water was heard several
miles away. It carried away all the bridges.
Several lives are reported lost. Loss to
reservoir \$75,000.
