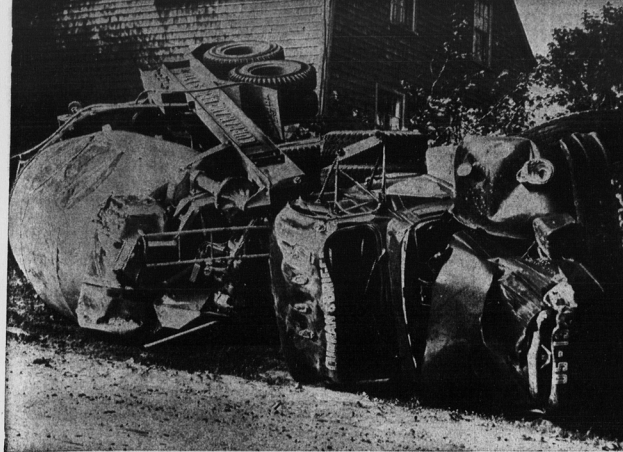

OTTAWA (CP)—The government hopes to put its contributory retirement pensions plan and a \$10 increase in basic old age pensions into effect next Jan. 1.

This it was learned on good authority, was the import of a remark by Prime Minister Pearson in the Commons Tuesday when he asked to announce a target date before Parliament adjourns for its summer recess.

Mr. Pearson told Stanley Knowles (NDP—Winnipeg North Centre) he would consider the idea of making a long-range forecast of the effective date and added:

"I hope the date will be earlier than my honorable friend (Mr. Knowles) fears."

To put the pensions plan and increase into effect Jan. 1, the government is co-ordinating the agreement among the provinces during September and legislative action by the House of Commons and Senate during October and November.

The government then would have some 12-month December-in which to complete the paper work for introduction of the plan on Jan. 1.

The only date so far mentioned by the government is early in 1964—December—these words were used by Health Minister, July Lalor when she unveiled the plan in the Commons July 18.

EXPLAINED DETAILS

She explained the plan in some detail to provincial representatives at the federal-provincial conference held here Friday and Saturday. It decided that a further meeting on the subject should be held "at an early date."

It is likely the provincial premier and her representatives will gather here again in September, soon after Labor Day, to carry on the discussions.

Parliament, expected to be called back into session Sept. 30, then would debate the resolution introduced by Miss Lalor in the light of the premier's conclusions and the government's hopes it would pass the bill based on it by the end of November—together with whatever other work Parliament has before it then.

In his Commons question Tuesday Mr. Knowles was pressing home that the government will increase the basic old age pension to \$75 from its present rate of \$65 in advance of starting the contributory pension plan.
