ordered this Autumn are also late summer blooming as the perennial borders are needing more color at that season. Rajah, is in vivid nasturtium-red coloring—scarlet-orange with garnet brown eye zone and it makes a brilliant splash of color. Boutonniere Daylily has myriads of small (2½) inch flowers with widely overlapping segments. The sepals are clear yellow and the petals are light rosy peach; this lily also blooms in August.

New plans are very interesting and often it is possible to find just the flower needed for a special spot. This fall I have noticed many flowers in other gardens planted in a sheltered place and still beautiful after quite severe frost. Lovely African Marigolds planted in the shelter of a white picket fence, and tall bright scarlet Salvia planted in the shelter of the dwelling which looked very well against the white wall.

Strange But True

You can't name a country from the Polar regions on the north to New Zealand in the south in which aborigines do not tattoo themselves. But the New Zealanders, incidentally, boast the most beautiful tattooing in the world, because it is curved, or spiral lines, elaborately and curiously patterned.

Arabia has no rivers, no forests, and is practically a desert dotted with many oases. Yet under this barren bosom of earth are important and substantial oil deposits. An old, old rhyme about the weather runs thus: "Evening red and morning gray Will see the traveler on his way; But evening gray and morning red Will bring down rain upon his head."

We now know that such weather signs are far from infallible. Yet according to meteorologists they have a slight scientific basis. A pale sky in the evening means that the atmosphere contains very little moisture and that rain is not likely to fall within the next twenty-four hours at least. On the other hand, a gray evening indicates the presence of moisture laden dust particles in the air, giving rise to the last couplet of the above verse.

The only woman ever to translate the Bible was Julia E. Smith of Glasbury, Connecticut. She set out on her laborious task when she was 77 and completed the job at the age of 84. Her translation of the Book of Books was published at Hartford in 1776 at her own expense.

There are approximately 100,000 Negro Jews in the U. S. A. They maintain synagogues in New York City and elsewhere. Crossing over to Latin America you'll find about 250,000 Negro Jews, while Africa boasts over 100 million. Like other Jews they were divided into two groups, orthodox and unorthodox. The first colored Jews were found in Ethiopia by James Bruce, the Scottish explorer, in 1790. Their origin cannot be definitely traced and some writers think they may be descendants from the Lost Tribes of Israel. When first contacted by Bruce they knew nothing of the Hebrew language. They had their own kings, however, who claimed they were descended from King David.

With almost 600 persons per square mile the Island of Mauritius, in the Indian Ocean, is one of the most densely populated regions in the world. Infanticide was practiced among civilized and savage peoples for many centuries, especially among the Asiatics and the Moaris of New Zealand. In China girls were killed off because they were as expensive and troublesome to raise as boys. The native Australians frequently killed their offsprings when they showed

signs of weakness. They also did away with one child when twins came into the world — usually the smaller or weaker one. Among prolific races, children were sometimes eaten by their parents to keep down the population. And all savage races were guilty of this atrocious practice. The Aleuts, for instance regarded child murder with horror, and believe it or not, in barbaric Africa, there is no one district noted for the destruction of their offsprings. The lily on account of its purity was adopted by Christianity as the symbol of the Resurrection, and as such it is the traditional Easter flower. Bermuda is the home of the lily where it is cultivated extensively for shipment to the U. S. A. and Canada in time to fill the Easter demand.

Here are a few superstitious notions concerning infants that have been handed down to us from past generations and are still believed by many persons in this country: "If an infant smiles in its sleep, it is seeing angels. If a baby cries at birth and lifts one hand, it is born to command. If a child cries while being baptized, it is simply the devil going out of it."

From such silly superstitions concerning the personalities of different children on various birthdays inspired these lines: "Monday's child is fair of face, Tuesday's child is full of grace, Wednesday's child is sour and sad, Thursday's child is merry and glad, Friday's child is loving and giving, Saturday's child must work for her living, But the child that is born on the Sabbath day Is blithe and bonny and good and gay."

Bridal and wedding superstitions have not lost their fervor with the passing of time. The following are still current: If you get married on Wednesday life will flow on like a beautiful stream. But if you go to the altar on Friday or Saturday you will be unhappy throughout your married life. Never consent to a double wedding. Why? Because it's sure to bring bad luck to one of the couples. A bride to be happy, should put her right foot forward when stepping across the threshold of the church. Pins were manufactured early in the fourteenth century. They were so hard to come by that sales were only permitted on the first and second of January of each year. At first only the wealthy could afford them but other women made a practice of putting aside a bit of money whenever they could spare it to purchase pins during the first days of the New Year — hence this money came to be known as "pin money." The phrase still sticks, and today we still refer to small amounts of money intended for sales as "pin money."
