3 Witnesses Testify In Liquor Seizing Case

GEORGETOWN — A very large docket was before Kings County Magistrate James S. Johnston, QC, in Georgetown yesterday. The Crown was represented by Deputy Attorney General J. Arthur McGuigan, QC.

Lawrence Wallace MacLeod, Murray River, charged with selling liquor to a person under 21 years of age, and represented by John P. Nicholson, heard the evidence of three crown witnesses, Cst. Miles E. Foster, RCMP, Montague; Carleton Malcolm MacDonald, Geeserow Cove, and Thomas Allen Bell, Murray Harbor. The case was adjourned to March 11.

Also adjourned to March 11, was the case of Russell James Bailey, Murray River, also represented by Mr. Nicholson, and charged with causing a disturbance in a public place by molesting other persons.

Lawrence Edward Burke-Carigan North, was fined \$25 and costs when he pleaded guilty to causing unnecessary suffering to a horse. The animal in question had fallen down and was left in a snowbank for several mately two hours. The animal subsequently had to be destroyed due to exposure.

In a ceremony whose form has become a PWC tradition over the years, the king and queen, along with prince Donald Ling and princess Betty Carol Matheson, were crowned by the college "archbishops".

The archbishop this year would ordinarily have been last year's king, Sterling Lashier. In his absence, fourth year student Barry D'Amico officiated.

At 10 p.m. the royal procession — the archbishop, king, queen, prince, princess, flower girls Nancy Weeks and Marjorie McLean, and page boys Brian Douglas and Myra Thistle, entered the auditorium and proceeded down a student-lined aisle to the thrones set up in front of the stage.

President Of King's College To Speak In Charlottetown

Harry D. Smith, CD, M.A., Ph.D., president of the University of King's College, Halifax, N.S., arrives in Charlottetown Saturday to speak at Sunday morning services in both St. Paul's and St. Peter's Cathedral. He will address a meeting of the Charlottetown Rotary Club, Monday.

Dr. Smith, the first Nova Scotia president of Canada's oldest university, was born in Halifax, attended grade school there, and earned his Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees at Dalhousie University where he majored in French.

From 1929 to 1940 he studied at the Sorbonne, having been sent to Paris by the French government as the recipient of a bursary and bronze medal. He taught for a year at the Halifax Academy before his wartime service as a naval officer.

After some time spent in teaching French at Queen Elizabeth High School in Halifax, he earned his Doctor of Philosophy degree, with distinction, in French at Laval University in Quebec City.

After four years as associate professor of French at Dalhousie he accepted the post of professor of French and head of the department of modern languages at the Canadian Services College, Royal Roads, Victoria, B.C.

During his 10 years on the West Coast, Dr. Smith travelled extensively and carried out university studies in Spain, Mexico and the United States. During the year 1962-63, he did specialized study in France, part of which was under the direction of the French government's department of external affairs, and on return accepted his present position.

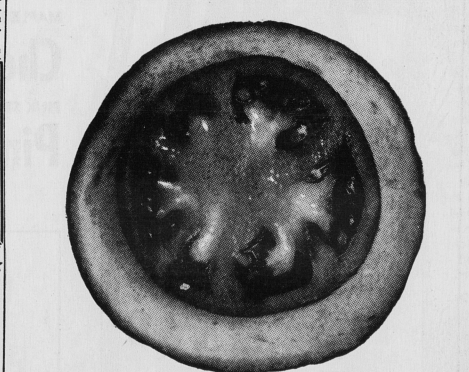
