## Four Island MPs Here Next Week

OTTAWA — All four Prince Edward Island members of parliament will be heading home in the next few days.

Nomination meetings in all three ridings of Queens, Kings and Prince will be held a day apart. The Island MPs plan on attending the meetings in all three ridings as a group, to lend support to their Conservative compatriots.

**MACLEAN'S PLANS**  
Fisheries Minister Angus MacLean goes to Quebec City on April 25 to address the annual meeting of the Fisheries Council of Canada. He will go on from there to attend the Queens nomination meeting on April 26 in Charlottetown.

Mr. MacLean plans to spend as much time as he can on the island during the campaign, but will have to return to Ottawa on government business several times and also will be doing some speaking for his party in other parts of Canada.

His riding-mate, Heath Macquarrie, has just returned from several days on the island. He plans to return there early next week and to devote almost the entire campaign to the island.

Dr. Orville Phillips leaves early next week and his Prince County nomination meeting is on April 28.

Mrs. Margaret Macdonald will leave Ottawa Friday, and her nomination meeting in Kings is scheduled for April 27.

### Child's Death In Hospital Investigated

EDMONTON (CP)—A nurse failed to tell doctors that an eight-year-old girl complained of having something stuck in her throat three days before the child died, a coroner's jury was told Tuesday.

The testimony was heard at an inquest into the death of Katherine Wood of Carvel, Alta. who died in Royal Alexandra Hospital March 4 from what a previous witness said was the effects of having a rubber tube lodged in her throat.

Thelma Paynter, head nurse of the hospital's children's ward, told the inquest the child said she had something stuck in her throat. Miss Paynter said she did not tell anyone about the complaint.

The jury was told earlier that the child had been given an anesthetic for a chest examination and a rubber tube was inserted in her throat to prevent her from swallowing her tongue.

Harry Melvin Hertz, Charlottetown, was sentenced to three months in the Queen's County jail on the charge of breaking out of the Catholic Welfare Bureau office, Pownall Street, having entered the same with the intent to commit an indictable offence.

### Technical School Plans Discussed

Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, met Tuesday with Ross Ford, director of the vocational training branch of the federal department of labor, to discuss plans for the proposed vocational high school that will serve Queens County.

Dr. Dewar said yesterday that Mr. Ford gave tentative approval to the proposed site in Charlottetown which is in the Belvedere Avenue—North River Road area. Also discussed was the best type of curriculum for the school.

According to Dr. Dewar, the department of education has engaged the services of the architectural firm of Webber, and Harrington, the Nova Scotia architects who designed the Nova Scotia Trade and Technical Institute in Halifax.

The minister said that several sites for the school are under consideration but that the Belvedere area site seems the most suitable.

### Bidault Sought By French Gov't

PARIS (Reuters)—The French government Wednesday was reported considering asking the National Assembly to lift the parliamentary immunity of missing ex-premier Georges Bidault following publication of leaflets suggesting he has taken over leadership of a Secret Army Organization resistance movement in France.

### Interest Rate Shows Increase

OTTAWA (CP)—Average interest rate of this week's issue of 92-day government treasury bills rose to 3.10 per cent from 3.04 last week, the Bank of Canada reported Wednesday.

The treasury bill rate, generally considered an indicator of conditions in the short-term money market, has been fluctuating around its present level since the start of the year.

### One Hospitalized As Result Of Two Collisions In Ch'town

As a result of two automobile collisions within the city since late Tuesday evening, two persons residents of Charlottetown required medical treatment, but only one was hospitalized for one day.

The first accident occurred at about 10:15 Tuesday evening, at the intersection of Hillsboro and Fitzroy streets. The mishap took place when a 1959 Meteor, driven by Mrs. Dane Crosby, Charlottetown, travelling north on Hillsboro, was struck by a 1955 Dodge station wagon moving west on Fitzroy.

In connection with the Dodge, all that the city police had to go

on last night was that the driver's last name is Pineau, and that he was apparently on deliveries for Johnson's Restaurant, Elm Avenue.

Lack of information was due to the driver being taken to the Charlottetown Hospital, where he was treated for facial injuries. He was released yesterday afternoon following treatment and a checkup.

Both vehicles were extensively damaged. The Meteor along the greater portion of the right side, and the Dodge had its front end almost demolished. The impact forced the Meteor through the fence and onto the lawn of the home of Mayor A. Walthein Gaudet.

The second accident took place at about 1:40 yesterday afternoon at the intersection of the Malpeque Road and Belvedere Avenue.

A 1956 Oldsmobile being driven west on Belvedere Avenue, by Miss Vivian Marie McPhee, Fighish, collided with a 1958 Dodge operated south on the Malpeque Road by Rev. Owen Sharkey, Charlottetown.

Both vehicles suffered heavy damage. The Oldsmobile to the right rear section and the Dodge to the left front section.

Miss Frances MacMillan, librarian at St. Dunstan's University, a passenger in the Dodge, suffered facial cuts. She was taken to the Charlottetown Clinic, and released to her home following treatment.

### Driving Case Is Adjourned

The case of Gordon Stanley MacInnis, Charlottetown, charged with impaired driving, was adjourned until Wednesday, April 25 by Magistrate James B. Johnston in the Queen's County magistrat's court yesterday, at the request of Deputy Attorney General Arthur MacGuigan, due to the absence of the crown witness. Counsel for the accused is J. P. Nicholson.

Bruce Arthur Jay, Pisquid East, appearing on the charge of unlawfully hunting out of season, was fined \$10 and costs or five days, with an order for confiscation of the weapon.

Richard Bruce Coolen, Charlottetown, was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days on the charge of unlawfully fishing out of season.

An accused was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days for possession of liquor in a place other than his residence.

Roger Allison Lord, North Tryon, was fined \$10 and costs for speeding, and Alger Cutcliffe, Cape Traverse, was fined a similar amount for a similar offence.
