

Last Minute Goal Gives Atlantics 4-3 Victory Over Sydney Millionaires

HALIFAX, Jan. 4—(CP)—Billy Good's last-minute goal gave Halifax Atlantics a 4-3 comeback win over Sydney Millionaires Saturday in a bitterly contested Maritime Major Hockey League game. Good, who thrilled a crowd of 2,000 fans, scored after Kenny Lauffman and Bill Ford wiped out the 3-1 deficit with a tremendous third-period rally.

Nick Pidsodny, who couldn't grab the sizzling, close-in shot, slammed his stick to the ice in anger. He had turned aside 36 shots while Halifax' Roy McMeekin handled only 16.

Millionaires, playing a cautious style of hockey, took advantage of Halifax laxity in the first two periods, which saw Freddy Hildebrand score three goals. After that they packed the blue-line and played stubbornly.

Two of Hildebrand's goals were breakaways.

Frank King scored Atlantics' other goal midway in the first period.

Boston Shuts Out Habs 1-0 Saturday; Toronto And Chicago In 1-1 Tie

MONTREAL, Jan. 4—(CP)—Bill Quackenbush's goal at 1:31 of the first period Saturday kept the Boston Bruins from scoring on Montreal Canadiens 1-0 before a crowd of 14,464.

The lone goal came when Real Chevrefils, picking up a rebound off the end boards on Leo Labine's shot, passed out to Quackenbush. The big Bruin defenseman whipped the puck into a high corner of the net.

From then on Canadiens tried desperately to catch up but the steady Boston defence and the brilliant goal-keeping of Jim Henry held them off. It was Henry's fourth shutout of the season.

The Bruins' win lifted them into a tie with Toronto for fourth place in the National Hockey League standings. The second-place Canadiens were tied by Chicago Black Hawks who played a 1-1 draw with Toronto and had a Sunday night game against Detroit Red Wings.

Henry was hit in the face by the puck on Ken Mosdell's shot late in the first period. His nose bled freely and he had to leave the ice. The teams took their respective periods rest then, with three minutes and 42 seconds of the first period left, playing the extra time on their return and changing ends after the regulation 20 minutes.

The Bruins were without three regular forwards and one defenseman because of injuries—Ed Sandford, Dave Creighton, Johnny Peirson and Hal Laycoe. Red Sullivan, brought up from the Bruins farm club at Hershey of the American Hockey League was used regularly.

Canadiens were without defenseman Butch Bouchard, injured in Detroit Wednesday night, veteran centre Elmer Lach, who suffered a broken thumb a few weeks ago, was back in action but was used sparingly.

In addition to scoring his team's goal, Quackenbush was a starburst on the Boston defence. Canadiens had almost a 2-1 edge on shots but many were from outside the defence and Henry snapped up the others.

Islanders Wallop Cellar-Dwelling Gloucester Bay Miners 5-1

GLoucester, Jan. 4—(Special)—The Charlottetown Islanders, displaying a smoother passing, better organized attack, to wallop the cellar-dwelling Gloucester Bay Miners 5-1 in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here Saturday night.

Centreman Roy "Buck" Whitlock led the Islanders to their fourth straight victory by firing two goals. Marcel Clements, Lyle Wiseman and Chuck Holdaway accounted for the Islanders' other goals.

Although outplayed, the Miners were not outshot. They directed 36 shots on Islanders netminder Al Millar, who turned in a standout performance. Don Lockhart in the Gloucester Bay Forum snared a rebound, a matter which tended to disgust the Bay fans.

Gloucester Bay fans rate Bill McCracken as their best player. They feel that Connie Bonhomme and Jim MacKenzie have strengthened the team considerably although McKenzie failed to show much on Saturday night. Bonhomme was probably the best of the Miners forwards. He worked hard, had one good scoring opportunity and got quite a hand from the fans after one of his better stunts on the ice.

Steve Brklacich and Marcel Clements rate as public enemies numbers one and two as far as the Miners' fans are concerned. Steve, who plays quite a colorful game, had his own feud with fans on the ice. Clements carried the puck during a determined offensive and the play inside the Islanders' blue-line almost three minutes. During this time they directed four shots at Al Millar but found the Islanders net custodian unbreakable.

Whitlock combined with Pawlshyn to score on the Islanders first try across the Gloucester Bay blue-line. Buck picked up Pawlshyn's rebound to fire the puck into the empty net.

Marcel Clements and Bob Gray set up Whitlock for his second goal. Clements carried the puck across the Bay blue-line and behind the net. Gray passed out from the side and Whitlock scored on a 15 foot shot into the lower left hand corner.

A little over two minutes later Holdaway ran the count to 3-0. Lyle Wiseman fed Clements a pass at centre and Marcel got a partial breakthrough. Holdaway picked up his pass at the goal mouth to draw Lockhart in a smart effort.

Down 3-0 the Miners opened up in an attempt to break Millar's goose egg. Play was fast and rough for the next ten minutes with Gus Gustavson and Bill Burega holding the spotlight with their heavy body checks.

The Islanders will likely need all their players tonight. The Sydney Millionaires, after a slow start under coach Johnny Horeck, showed on Saturday night that they are coming out of their slump. They will fly here today in order to be rested for the game and they should be ready to give one of their best exhibitions on Island ice this season. As a rule the Millionaires come up with a crowd pleasing type of game although they have been outclassed by the Islanders to date.

Cosch Murph Chamberlain is hoping for a good turn-out of fans. The Hardrock, who has his Islanders in high gear, maintains that the team can not operate unless the spectators turn out in greater numbers for the Sydney and Gloucester Bay games. The attendances for these games have been small during the past couple of weeks and the large crowds at the Halifax games have not been able to make up for the deficit incurred.
